TRACES HISTORY OF ARDEN SHORE CAMP

WAS STARTED IN 1901

Began as Adjunct to Gads Hill Settlement; Summer Budget Has Grown to \$20,000

The following article was written in response to inquiries from time to time regarding the number of years that Arden Shore Camp has been in operation, how the present site was acquired, the change of name, etc. Mrs. Gregory has been connected with the Camp from the beginning and is one of its most enthusiastic supporters.

Arden Shore Camp from the Beginning

This fresh air camp started as an adjunct to Gad's Hill Settlement, then as now, in the neighborhood of West 22nd St. and Robey, Chicago. In 1901 Mrs. Leila Moss Martin, the founder of that settlement was given the use of about nine acres on the lake shore between Glencoe and Highland Park, through the kindness of Mr. W. A. Alexander and Mr. Dummer. There were no permanent buildings, only tents, and we could accommodate thirty guests. The Central Church, of Chicago, gave \$500 towards its support. The camp was called Gads Hill.

It was an original idea of Mrs. Martin's to ask each North Shore suburb, from Evanston to Waukegan, to support the camp for one week, and \$250 per week did it. It is a far cry in these twenty-one years to a summer budget alone of nearly \$20,000 and a camp of 500 guests.

But oh, the fun we women had as we cut and spread bread and butter and waited on our hungry guests, experimented with simple American desserts which they would be willing to eat—pie was the only one they trusted unreservedly—and then gave evening entertainments by the light of kerosene lamps.

It was in 1904 that we had our first general North Shore entertainment to raise a common fund. This was a County Fair held in the tents before our guests arrived, and we cleared \$2,000. This seemed to us such a huge sum that we deliberated whether we would not better invest \$1,000 of it and only use the interest. However wiser counsel prevailed and a frame dining room was built which could be screened from the flies and was connected with the kitchen, built the year before.

These general entertainments, in one form or another, were continued under the able leadership of Mrs. F. B. McMullin, until we had a fund of \$8,000 to start the purchase of a permanent site.

In June 1907 an option was taken on our present property of 21 5/7 acres of woodland on the shore of Lake Michigan just north of the village of Lake Bluff. Possession was obtained in March 1908 at a total cost of \$17,000 and the deed was only the third transfer from the Government. There was certainly no activity in real estate then!

Afterwards it was felt that the name of the camp should be changed as much confusion arose in the minds of contributors, between Gads Hill Settlement in Chicago and Gads Hill Camp at Lake Bluff. The directory wished to express in the name the beauty of the location, and in casting about in their minds for a suitable name they hit upon Arden Shore—giving the idea both of the forest and the water.

The work of the camp and its value to the community have steadily increased from year to year. Permanent buildings, in addition to the tents for summer guests, and much larger equipment have been found necessary. These have been provided from time to time through the generosity of our friends.

The winter of 1912-13 saw the fulfillment of the long discussed plan by which the camp property could be used the year round. The character of this work was that of caring for men who would be benefitted by fresh air, out-of-door sleeping, and nourishing food, whether they were convalescing from an illness or just in a generally depleted condition. This work was very successful while it lasted but during the war it had to be discontinued for lack of funds.

But in the fall of 1919 the camp was again opened for winter work—this time for under-nourished boys who could not get their working certificates. This work is now so well established and the results are so gratifying that Arden Shore may be regarded as a permanent year round camp.

The particular natural advantages of the camp are its 300 foot frontage on a large lake, which admits of hygienic bathing and swimming; the shade of trees which gives the benefit of coolness in summer to the vacation our guests have during the year; and the accessibility of the camp, not only to the mothers and children who come as guests, but to our subscribers as well, upon whom we rely for support.
