Flatwork pieces ironed, 5c per lb. extra. One-day service.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

The monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held last Monday evening at the Community Center. At this meeting a letter was read from a member of the Board suggesting that Community Service act as a clearing house in the matter of scheduling of lectures, entertainments, and other activities of a public nature. The letter stated that many organizations found their entertainments in conflict with those given on the same night by others, which might be avoided if there was some central place like the Community Center where a schedule of events might be kept. It was pointed out that with all organizations co-operating in sending in their dates to the Center — any organization wishing to hold a lecture or some other form of entertainment could first look at this schedule to see if there was any other conflicting activity and govern themselves. After discussion it was decided that a large calendar could be placed on the bulletin board at the Center and all

dates of attractions scheduled there. If Highland Park organizations think this a good plan Community Service will be glad to furnish this service.

A Community Twilight Baseball league for boys is now completely organized and ready for business.
