

## our Lawn



A so-called Lawn is composed of hundreds and often many thousands of individual plants of Grass, according to its size, strange as it may seem, yet each one of these individual plants if given proper room for development as nature has intended, would occupy at least a space from 8 to 12 inches square and the plant itself would grow up to two feet or more, flower, go to seed, die down and grow up again, the decayed foliage acting as a protection to the roots as well as Fertilizer and this holds good with practically every variety of Grass used for Lawn, the Kentucky Blue, Red Top, Foxtail and other sorts.

When growing such Grasses in a Lawn in a crowded condition and using the Lawn mower once a week during Summer, the best Lawn will run out sooner or later if plant food of some kind isn't supplied, every time the grass is being cut additional nourishment is needed to produce new growth, that is why Lawns, not fed, run out, why weeds take the place of the Grass and why Moss will spread, both Weeds and Moss only get a foot hold where there is

a weak stand of Grass or where Grass has died out. In England and other parts of Europe, they have perfect Lawns consisting of a velvety turf, forty and more years old, because they are tended to, kept clean, nourished and rolled, with us it means to ofttimes dig up and reseed a Lawn every five or six years due to neglect, the Owner doesn't notice anything wrong with his Lawn until the Grass is all starved out and weeds are in its place, a good Lawn can't be developed in a year, it takes time, labor, patience and above all plant food to encourage a healthy growth and the more shade there is, the more attention is required if results are wanted.

Right now is the best time to go over the Lawn with a sharp iron rake, remove moss, dead grass and weeds and stir up the surface of the soil between the Grass, apply a good dose of Darling's Blood and Bone Phosphate Fertilizer followed by a liberal amount of Grass Seed and a light rolling, get some life into your Lawn, a little Fertilizer applied each year doesn't cost much but will be of greater benefit than anything else you could do to your Lawn. A good Lawn is so important to the Home Ground and with each year more attention is being paid to it, all else you may have in the way of Trees, Shrubs or flowers will never take the place of your Lawn.
