NEW TRIER EDGES OUT DEERFIELD IN CONTEST

Elm Place Makes Good Showing in Music Memory Test Saturday

Out of a possible total score for each team of 5000 points, New Trier totaled 4799 against Deerfield's 4357. This was largely in the way of a try-out for the final event of the contest, the program at Orchestra Hall on Saturday, April 15, and both schools are to be congratulated on the result.

The five students ranking highest from each school will constitute the team that goes to Orchestra Hall. Deerfield's five will be June Freeman, Virginia Onderdonk and Harriet Gorbey, each of whom had perfect scores (250), Elizabeth Holland (249) and Edna Walther (240). Henry Dickinson will be alternate.

In the grade school contest at New Trier Elm Place ranked third, with Evanston, Dist. 75 leading, and Wilmette second. Glencoe was fourth and Winnetka fifth. The final team for Elm Place will be Kathryn Wayne, Elizabeth Booth, Dorothy May, Anne Wood and Clover Benson.

Great interest has been aroused in all music circles over the contest. On Sunday, April 9, Mr. Finston and his Chicago Theatre Symphony Orchestra are devoting their entire Sunday morning symphony concert (11:45 a. m.) to numbers from the contest list, and the management is offering special students rate (half price) to all schools where a contest is being held.

For the contest at Orchestra Hall prizes have been offered to the winning schools, consisting of a Lyon & Healy grand piano, a Brunswick and a Cheney phonograph to the high schools; and a Messner "Monogram" piano, a Columbia and a Victor talking machine to grade schools. Local theatres in all sections have been cooperating by using music from the contest list.

It is to be hoped that the north shore will turn out a splendid delegation of parents and students to hear the program at Orchestra Hall. It is to be held at 2:15 p. m. Saturday, April 15.

Besides the contest numbers the orchestra will give a concert while the papers are being graded and the winners announced. The tickets will be on sale at the door at 25, 35 and 50 cents, so that all students as well as parents can well afford to go.
