### STATE OFFICIAL INSPECTS SCHOOLS

#### WILL MAKE FULL REPORT

Several High Schools May Be Added to Accredited List: Other County News Items

J. C. Hanna of Springfield, state supervisor of high schools, has just completed an inspection of the rural high schools of Lake county. Mr. Hanna visited high schools at Lake Villa, Wauconda, Lake Zurich, Libertyville, Antioch, Gurnee and the "preparatory college" at Zion City. Upon his return to Springfield he will submit a report to the state, in which he will make recommendations. Upon the result of these recommendations depends whether or not these high schools will be placed on the recognized list, which compares to the accredited list of the larger high schools. To students who intend to attend college it is essential that their training be received in a recognized or accredited high school.

The will of the late Charles Pope, father of J. William Pope, who resided in Waukegan for many years and is well known there, disposing of an estate valued at more than \$3,000,000, was filed for probate last Friday before Assistant Probate Judge Paul Corkell of Chicago. The former Waukegan man's share of the estate will be in the neighborhood of \$600,000.

J. S. Butterfield died at his home in Libertyville last Saturday after an illness of three months. He was 88 years of age, and a well known resident of the town. The funeral was held from the Libertyville home at 1:30 p. m. Monday.

With the arrest late Thursday afternoon of two Waukegan women on a charge of being bootleggers the local police are hopeful that they have gone a long way toward checking the importation into Waukegan from Chicago of immense quantities of moonshine whiskey.

Through popular subscription and the presenting of entertainments and dances the volunteer firemen of Antioch will buy a motor truck and will present it to the city, according to Antioch residents.

Mayor W. Hurd Clendenin of Zion City, was made defendant in a mandamus petition filed in Circuit court last Friday by the members of Grace Missionary church of Zion. The bill was filed by Attorney Albert Hall.

In the petition it is charged that there is a deliberate conspiracy on the part of city officials in Zion to prevent the Independents from constructing their church.
