He also had a large majority in West Deerfield. Mr. Obee received 681 votes in this township the largest number cast for any single candidate.

Decker and Jack ran so close that the final result was not accurately termined until yesterday morning. James G. Welch, the third contestant for the office of probate judge, received only 2,509 votes.

The contest between Alice E. Smith and T. Arthur Simpson for superintendent of schools was another close one.

Congressman Carl R. Chindblom, candidate for re-election was a 10-1 t vorite in this township, and he carried the county by about 6-1. Although the complete returns from the other counties in the tenth district have not been received, Mr. Chindblom's re-nomination is assured. The latter wa in Highland Park yesterday for a few hours, and lunched with Charles Harbaugh and Paul L. Udell at the Y. W. C. A. cafeteria. He declared that he was greatly pleased with the support given him on the north shore.

Congressman Chindblom's plurality over Blaul in the entire Tenth district was 17,190. His majority over all candidates was 10,082.

William F. Weiss, Charles H. Francis, and William L. Pierce were nomnated for representatives in the General Assembly from the Eighth dis trict. Their ballots in the county were reported to be as follows: Weiss, 16,629; Francis, 5,165; and Pierce, 11,307. Gunthorp, the fourth candidate,

Ahlstrom was a great favorite in Highland Park, receiving practically

three-fourths of the vote. Very few Democratic ballots were cast in this township, twenty being the most in any precinct. In some precincts only two or three were cast. Incom plete returns indicate that Graham carried the district.
