State's Attorney's Men Chop \$25,000 Worth of Bits; Act is Filmed

Before a battery of movie cameras, last week, Col. ROAD CONSTRUCTION WAITS ON GOVERNOR

Work Cannot Be Started on Highways Until Plans Are Approved

Charles E. Russell, county superintendent of highways, is still waiting for the road plans which Gov. Small promised to release from the state highway department in order that the work may progress as rapidly as possible.

"We can't advertise for bids until the plans are returned as there may be changes in the curves," said Mr. Russell. "We are not anticipating any changes, but we can not be certain until the plans are returned."

The work on the roads must necessarily be delayed until the plans are received, and it is feared that if the city road work is started before the county work is opened, contractors will be more anxious for the city jobs, and will bid high on the county work.

RIGHT-OF-WAY IS OBTAINED IN ELA

Insures Paving of Rand Road Road Among First In Lake County

The Town of Ela, according to Charles Russell, county superintendent of highways, has set the pace for the rest of Lake county in obtaining right of way for the proposed state roads, work on which will be started in the near future providing the right of way has been obtained.

Credit for having obtained the right of way goes to Fred Grimm, highway commissioner of Ela and also to Supervisor E. A. Ficke, who assisted him. Supt. Russell is loud in his praise of Mr. Grimm for having obtained the right of way so cheaply.

From the county line to Lake Zurich the cost was \$21. From Lake Zurich to Wauconda the cost was \$12. In one place it was necessary to cut off a corner to straighten out the highway. This cost only \$75. Mr. Grimm visited between 25 and 30 property owners and received the signature of each for \$1. This insures the paving of the Rand road among the first in the county. The right of way obtained already does not include Lake Zurich village but no difficulty is anticipated there. In one place there the officials obtained part of an acre at the rate of \$340 an acre.
