NORTH SHORE HELPS CHINDBLOM

The support which the north shore gave Congressman Carl R. Chindblom in Tuesday's primary election was a distinct blow to the Thompson-Lundin regime. It was largely the big victory in this part of the district that enabled Mr. Chindblom to beat his competitor, Daniel J. Blaul. Mr. Chindblom has represented the people of this district faithfully at Washington, and their appreciation of his valuable service was proved in the primary.

FINAL ROAD TEST

The final series of tests on one of the largest and most comprehensive road experiments ever attempted began March 27. This experiment is being conducted on two miles of highway at Bates, Ill. This stretch was designed and constructed by the Illinois highway commissioner and the United States Bureau of Public Roads. It includes 63 different sections representing as many different methods and kinds of construction and having various kinds and thicknesses of highway building material. This road was completed April, 1921, and highway engineers have been making observations ever since for the effect of temperature changes, etc. The road will now be subjected to the final test, that of the heavy truck traffic, for the application of which a fleet of 10 motor trucks of the war department will be used. The results are expected to show definitely the types of pavement that can be expected to support heavy traffic. All of the data collected will be analyzed and from it will be obtained the knowledge necessary for the rational design of all public highways.
