SCHOOLS RANK FOURTH IN MUSIC CONTEST

AT ORCHESTRA HALL, SAT.

Results Gratifying Considering Late Entry. Twenty-eight Schools Compete. Many Attend

Deerfield-Shields High School and Elm Place school were each represented by a team in the Music Memory Contest on last Saturday afternoon and although neither came in among prize winners, each made an honorable record. Elm Place ranked fourth among grammar schools, and Deerfield-Shields ranked fourth among high schools, there being twenty-eight teams in the contest. Among the high schools, New Trier was first, Thornton Township at Harvey was second and Evanston Township was third. Cicero was first among grammar schools, Wilmette was second and District 76 of Evanston was third. Of course not everyone could be prize winners and the showing of the local teams was very gratifying considering the late start each had made in the contest. For example the preliminary contest among grammar schools in Evanston was held before Elm Place started in training.

Deerfield-Shields was represented by the following students: June Freeman, Virginia Onderdonk, Harriet Gorley, Elizabeth Holland and Edna Walther.

The pupils from Elm Place were: Catherine Wagner, Dorothy May, Ann Wood, Clover Benson and Elizabeth Booth.

The contest and accompanying concert at Orchestra Hall was an inspiring affair. Mr. Stock presided with his full orchestra, all of these men donating their services. The manager of the hall gave the use of it rent free and the spectators paid only a nominal fee to cover extra expenses. The contestants with pencils and writing pads were distributed in the boxes and on the right and left wings of the balcony. The orchestra played characteristic but tantalizingly short excerpts from the list of thirty-five compositions while the contestants wrote down the name of the composition together with that of the composer and the facts of his nationality. Spelling and punctuation were graded along with the facts about the compositions.

After selections from twenty compositions had been played, the papers of the grammar school pupils were taken up, the high school pupils continuing to write until five additional selections were played.

While the judges were marking the papers Mr. Stock conducted an impromptu musical contest for the benefit of his juvenile auditors. Though the enthusiasm and eagerness this aroused was at times decidedly clamorous, Mr. Stock enjoyed the affair greatly, bantering his auditors and acting in school boy fashion himself. His musicians surely played as well as they ever do and the audience repaid the soloist with mighty applause. The program brought out the fact that in the big audience of children there were many who were so familiar with standard music of the highest grade that they could recognize without hesitation, for example, the details of the different movements of Beethoven's 5th Symphony, etc. If this is a true sign of musical progress as a whole in our schools, it is a heartening one.
