

PLANTING TIME

There are just about three weeks left during which time Perennials or Hardy flowering plants can be planted to bloom this summer, more and more are these old favorites being appreciated and no Home ground is complete without them.

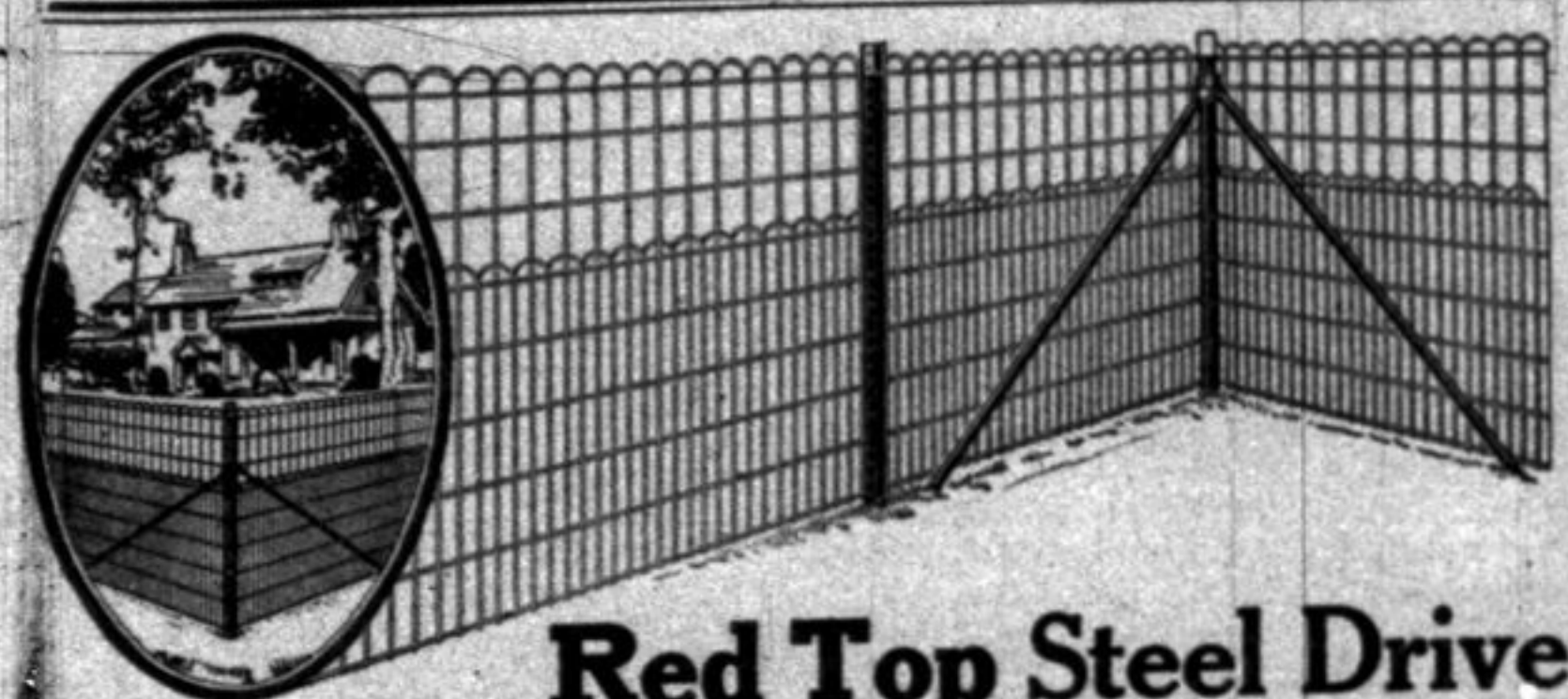
