COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Community Service Board of Directors at the monthly meeting held last Monday evening decided to close the Community Center on Sundays during the summer months. The public will take due notice thereof and transact any business with the Executive Secretary on Saturday or the following Monday.

Miss Adele Everett, Mrs. E. A. Bournique and Rev. Walter Bihler were appointed on a committee to investigate the needs and possibilities of a summer playground for children at the beach this summer. It is hoped by officials of Community Service to establish a playground program under a competent Supervisor at the beach for children of Highland Park during the heated term. With a playground instructor at the beach during the day mothers could send their children and know they would be taken care of and at the same time receive instruction in folk dancing, games, activities.

The demand for help has now exceeded the supply—we need men for gardening and general work of all kinds—also women for house work. Apply at the Community Center.

Mrs. Annette Jones, chairman of the music committee, has arranged a wonderful program for the spring concert, which is the last number of the Community Lyceum Course. This number will appear at Elm Place school on the evening of May 25. Program and artists will be announced later. The monthly report of Community Service is as follows:

Community Service of Highland Park was actively interested in 30 activities during the month of April—a total of 10 organizations were involved in activities either promoted by Community Service or aided by Community Service.

Among the activities were meetings of the Americanization classes—Meeting of the degree team of the Knights of Pythias at the Center—the American Legion—The Junior Auxiliary—supervision of dances for the North End Athletic club—a community entertainment and play night for the West Ridge Community club—Twilight Baseball League for boys—and the Minstrel show being produced under the joint auspices of The Young Mens' club and Community Service.

MRS. MEEHAN WAS RECEIVED BY KING

VISITED SIAMESE COURT

Highland Park Woman Makes Study of Orient; Co-Director of "Fool's Paradise"

Mrs. Florence Burgess Meehan, wife of H. H. Meehan, general purchasing agent of the A. B. Dick Co., Chicago, is one of the co-directors of the motion picture "A Fool's Paradise," which will appear at the Pearl theatre May 8, 9 and 10. The Meehans are residents of Highland Park.

The observations made by Mrs. Meehan in the Far East proved so interesting that Asia, that wonderfully literary exponent of the Orient, asked her to write an account of her stay in Bangkok. From this account it appears that while King Rama VI is an autocrat, yet his government is more like an advanced state socialism than anything else. The state owns the main lines of railways, the oil fields, the forests and the mines, as well as the street cars, water works and lighting system of Bangkok. The state is the king. Fortunately for his people, the present incumbent of the throne governs for them painstakingly and without undue harshness. After meeting him, Mrs. Meehan found him to be exceedingly democratic in spirit and, in her article, relates that she knows but just one act of his that might be called tyrannical—a recent order that the women of Siam must let their hair grow long. For centuries the women of Siam have enjoyed the freedom of short hair. Like the men, they wore it straight back from the forehead. But now, just when a few women of the western world are daring to wear their hair short, the king has decreed that Siamese women must conform to western custom and put themselves into the bondage of combs and hairpins and invisible nets. Imagine the consternation in the United States if congress should pass a law compelling all women to bob their hair.

Mrs. Meehan was received by the king in a great room, lacquered in royal red and hung with magnificent embroideries. He and his attendants were simply dressed in khaki uniforms. The king is a small man, but little over 5 feet in height, but the keen intelligence of his face and the quiet dignity of his manner give him a truly royal air. The royal conversation with Mrs. Meehan was formal—the king said that he was pleased to receive Americans and was greatly interested in Americans. Upon being informed by those who constituted the audience that they were equally pleased with his realm, the king replied that he was glad they found his kingdom pleasant. Those in the reception line bowed and curtsied, backed awkwardly down the length of the hall and went out between the two gorgeous manjunks who constituted the royal guard. These guards are on duty four hours at a time and it is contrary to all discipline for them to move a muscle. Yet in spite of the really terrible physical strain involved, Mrs. Meehan says that the position is the most coveted in the royal household.

HIGH SCHOOL AWARDED SERVICE CERTIFICATES

Deersfield-Shields Students Help in Campaign for Near East Relief.

A Certificate of Service has been awarded to the Deersfield-Shields high school for the contribution from the pupils of the school toward saving the lives of thousands of helpless orphan children in the Near East. The certificate was sent to Principal R. L. Sandwick, by the Illinois office of Near East Relief, at 199 South LaSalle street, Chicago, and signed by Cleveland H. Dodge, National treasurer, C. V. Vickrey, General secretary and John Finley, chairman of the National Educational Advisory Committee.

School children all over the state as well as all over the country, are reported to be taking a great interest in this effort to raise funds to relieve the suffering among the children of the Near East. The school contributions are a part of the general campaign in the state which is designed to care for 20,000 orphan children for one year. Each \$60 raised in the state supports an orphan child for one year.

The campaign through the schools is put on with the approval and under the cooperation of Francis G. Blair, state superintendent of schools, who is chairman of the Illinois Educational Advisory board for Near East Relief.
