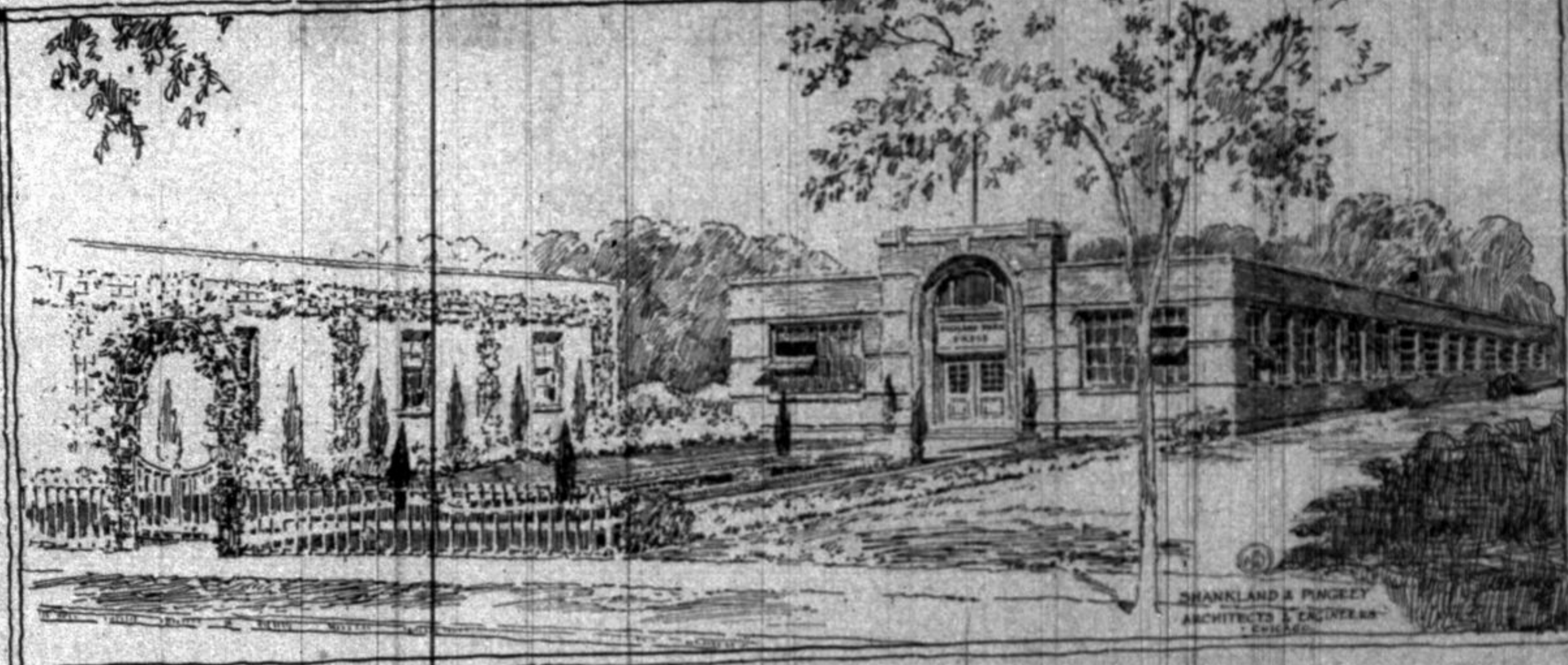

New Highland Park Press Factory Building Under Construction on Central Avenue

The Highland Park Press will be housed in its new building at present under process of construction, before July 1, according to plans. The new building, a sketch of which appears above, will occupy the rear of the property adjoining the present Press building on the west. It will be 90x50 feet, a one-story structure of concrete, brick, steel and glass. Face brick will be used on the exterior all around, and the building, it is be-

lieved will be a very creditable addition to Highland Park. The front 100 feet of the lot will be kept as a flower garden. When the complete plans are finally realized a two-story store and office building will occupy that part of the property. The new building will be large enough so that new equipment may be added from time to time as it is made necessary by the increasing business done by the company. The Press will maintain a small office in the old building for the convenience of its patrons. The rest of the space in that structure will be occupied by the Y. W. C. A. cafeteria, and a local real estate firm.

The Udell Printing Company, which was incorporated a few days ago, includes the Highland Park Press and The Lake Forester. Under the new co-operative arrangement, employees of the firm are given an opportunity to purchase shares of stock. The company now employs about 25 individuals, 15 of whom are heads of families, most of them living in Highland Park. The business done by the concern is increasing in scope and in volume rapidly, and includes much printing and publishing of a national character. Thus, thousands of dollars of outside money are brought to Highland Park each year to be spent by The Press.

#### ELKS LOSE TO VISITORS

Opening Game of Season Next Sunday Afternoon; Famous "Jackrabbits" Booked

The Elks' baseball team was beaten 3-2 by a team from the Chicago Elks' Lodge, No. 4, last Sunday in the first home game of the season. The game seemed to belong to Highland Park from the first, but several close decisions ruined the hopes of the local fans.

The home boys scored twice in the first frame. Then things were quiet until the seventh, when Chicago made three runs with as many hits. There were no later scores. In the fifth Highland Park had two men on bases second and third, with two out. "Paddy" White came up to bat. "Paddy" had not been hitting the sphere much this year, so the fans had a hunch that he was due to slam one. He did. The ball sped down the left field foul line, driving in the two men on bases. This made the score 4 to 0, but the "umps" called the hit a foul. After a second look he called it a fair. Then the visitors began to argue, and the umpire returned to his original decision, sending the two men back to base, and "Paddy" back to bat. He fied out with a long one to right field.

In the seventh Chicago got to Williams for three hits, and scored on all. Highland Park had a chance to tie the score again in the ninth, but failed. White, first up, fisted a fly to the center fielder. Williams then received a free ticket. Green-glade got his first hit of the game, sending Williams to second. Clark knocked a fast grounder to the second baseman, who let it slip through his legs. Williams tried to make home before the ball was recovered. Fahlen-dorf, Chicago's second baseman, made a fast recovery and threw perfectly to home in time to nail Williams.

Manager Deering has booked the fast "Jack Rabbits" of Chicago for the opening game of the season next Sunday afternoon. He has also signed up an association umpire for the game.

### ELM PLACE SCHOOL SAVED FROM BLAZE

#### FIRE SUNDAY MORNING

Damage Estimated Near \$3,000 - Prompt Action of Firemen Saves Building From Destruction

A fire which caused about \$1,000 damage at the Elm Place school Sunday morning was checked in time to save the building from destruction by the prompt action of the local fire department. Principal Jesse L. Smith and Engineer R. W. Davies of the school fortunately were at the school when the fire broke out, and they discovered the blaze before it had become uncontrollable.

The school work is being carried on as usual now. Monday class work was suspended while the building was being cleaned and prepared for the students.

The origin of the fire is not definitely known. It is believed, however, that imperfect wiring was to blame. Wires passing through an enclosed space under an upper stairway, although insulated from direct contact with studding were unprotected in the open, and it is possible that contact with dangerous consequences occurred here. The fire has evidently been smouldering for some time and when it ate through the wall on the east wall of the auditorium stage it burst out with violence. Cloth covered screens and stage draperies contributed to its progress and it was eating through the floor of the hall above when discovered. Only ten minutes or so before this happened Mr. Smith and Engineer Davies had crossed the first floor hall and gone up into the office to look up some data. Starting down they found smoke in the hall way and a hurried trip to the auditorium revealed a hot blaze on the stage.
