



SAILOR PROVES TOO MUCH FOR "FRITZ" GIESER

"FRITZ" DOWNED IN THE SECOND ROUND TUESDAY

SHOWS EXCELLENT FORM WHILE IN THE RING

Highland Park Boxer Loses to Sailor After Game Battle at Fort Sheridan Carnival; Douglas Wins By Technical Knockout

Joe Slivver of Great Lakes proved to be a thorn in Fritz Gieser's streak of consecutive victories, by stopping the popular Highland Park boy in 2 rounds, at the American Legion boxing carnival at Fort Sheridan Tuesday night.

The whole of Highland Park were greatly disappointed, inasmuch as they expected Fritz to keep on winning. Nevertheless, Fritz deserves a great deal of credit. He was good as long as he lasted.

Slivver who had recently arrived from Hampton Roads, Virginia, in time to "sub" for Moorman, who could not go on as the result of an automobile accident, demonstrated his ability as a fighter with a real "sock". Gieser showed wonderful form. He made the unfortunate mistake, however of fighting from the ropes, which placed him in an awkward position and in no way to defend himself. Slivver was acquainted with that method of fighting, and it was an easy matter for him to shoot right jabs to the jaw, every time Gieser would attempt to swing from the ropes in an endeavor to add strength to his right "hammer," for which he is noted. This proved useless against such a fighter as Slivver. Just the force of swinging from the ropes and stopping the sailor's right jabs on the "button" caused the blow to be all the harder.

The knockout came in the second round, after some hot infighting, with honors even, and a right cross to Gieser's jaw caused him to go down and for the full count.

Allen Douglas Wins

In the main event of the evening, Allen Douglas of Chicago was awarded a technical knockout over Jimmy "Kid" Russell of Fort Sheridan, in the seventh round of a scheduled 10 round bout.

Douglas proved to be too strong an opponent for Russell, and carried the fight throughout. He used a rabbit punch consistently, which caused Russell considerable worry. It became necessary for the referee to stop the bout in the seventh round, in order to save Russell from further punishment. Russell was game to the last however, and took considerable punishment. It was just a case of being up against too good a man. They weighed in at 118 pounds.

The "Curtis-Carter" bout, proved to be the best fight of the evening and was also worth the price of admission. It can be safely said, that it was the best bout ever held at the Fort. Both knew the game well and fought "toe to toe" throughout. Such infighting was never seen before. Both could punch, and gloves were flying everywhere, in fact, too fast for the audience to follow. A knock-out seemed imminent in every stage of the fight. They kept each other dazed with right hooks to the jaw and stomach. There was considerable feeling between the two men, and they agreed to fight on a "winner take all" basis. At the end of their six round session, a draw was awarded them, which was, however, questioned by the spectators, inasmuch as some thought Nick Carter, the Great Lakes boy should have been given a slight shade over the Waukegan boy. They tipped the scales at 160 pounds.

Stanley's Work Clever

Lou Stanley of Waukegan gave Rocky Angelo of Chicago a neat trimming in six rounds. Stanley's skill and cleverness as a boxer was unequalled. However, Angelo proved he was game, and was given a great hand for putting up a game losing fight. How Rocky weathered the storm in the fourth round cannot be understood. After a hard knock-down he arose dazed and fairly exhausted, nevertheless, managed to remain on his feet for the remainder of the fight. They weighed in at 122 pounds.

In the curtain raiser, "Kid" Knowlton of Great Lakes spoiled what was going to be a good fight by knocking out "K. O." De Mon de Groff, the Grays Lake southpaw in the second round. Both were mixing it fiercely until the knockout. They weighed 135 pounds.

The boys performed to a sell-out house, as practically the whole north shore turned out to see their last fight. It was the biggest house the gymnasium ever held.

These bouts were held under the auspices of the Lake County Council of the American Legion, and much credit can be given the various Legion posts along the north shore for making the show a success. The next show will be held Decoration day in the open air, in which the principals will be Gene Watson, the featherweight champion of the Pacific coast and Teddy Murphy of the Stock Yards. They will go ten rounds.

The Juniors placed second in the meet with 25 points. Oak Park won with 46 points.

On Friday the preliminaries for the high schools will be run off besides a track meet between Illinois and Notre Dame and a baseball game between Illinois and Notre Dame. The preliminaries in the golf and tennis tournaments will be held Friday. On Saturday the finals in the track event, tennis and golf will be held. Illinois will play Michigan in baseball also, Saturday afternoon. This meet which is the 28th annual meet held by the university will be a great event for the schools of the state. Five hundred schools were invited and hundreds are expected to participate. The coach is not sure who he will take to Illinois but he expects to take a championship team.

MUNICIPAL LINKS AT GLENCOE OPEN

Skokie Playfield Course Begins 1922 Season; Changes in Registration

Skokie Playfield Golf course at Glencoe was officially opened for the 1922 season last Saturday with bright prospects for excellent play with the course considerably improved over former years.

Several changes in method of registering were effected this Spring. Among these is the registration of non-resident players and guests for the purpose of maintaining an accurate check on the number of persons using the course. Another change is a new system of listing by the starter of tag numbers of residents and ticket numbers of non-residents to establish the order of starting play, thus avoiding complications existing under the former system.

Registration fees for the season are arranged by the Park board are as follows:

- Group A. man and wife or one other woman of immediate family, \$12
- Group B. Men over 21 years of age, \$12.
- Group C. Women other than those included in Group A. \$7.
- Group D. Juniors; 19 to 21 years of age, inclusive, \$5.

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
