LINCOLN SCHOOL P.T.A. ELECTS OFFICERS

Mrs. Arthur Byfield and Miss Florence Chandler Give Delightful Program

The last regular meeting of the Lincoln School P. T. A. was held Wednesday afternoon, May 10th, at the school building. A business session and election occupied the first hour. Interesting reports were read giving a comprehensive survey of the practical work conducted during the year, showing a great increase in membership and working fund, and a constructive program of educational talks, teacher-pupil demonstrations of school work, musical and dramatic entertainments, and fine lectures including two by Miss Flora J. Cooke of the Fratic Parker School and Prof. Frank Slutz, Director of the Moraine Park school of Dayton, both expert factors in the educational world.

Miss Ruth Ewing, president, said these reports spoke for themselves sufficiently to show what the aim, effort and accomplishment of the organization had been, without further comment. She thought perhaps the best achievement had been in generating a fine spirit of interest and co-operation among the fathers as well as the mothers and teachers in the district, and took occasion to thank the members of the Association collectively and the officers and committeemen, separately for their faithful devotion to the work of the organization in deep appreciation of the generous sacrifice of time and energy made by them in its behalf.

An election of officers followed in which Miss Ruth Ewing was re-elected president and Mrs. W. G. Sanderson, vice-president; Mrs. H. W. Branigar was made secretary and Mrs. Harry Paul, treasurer. A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring secretary and treasurer, Mrs. Rossetter and Mrs. Glidden.
