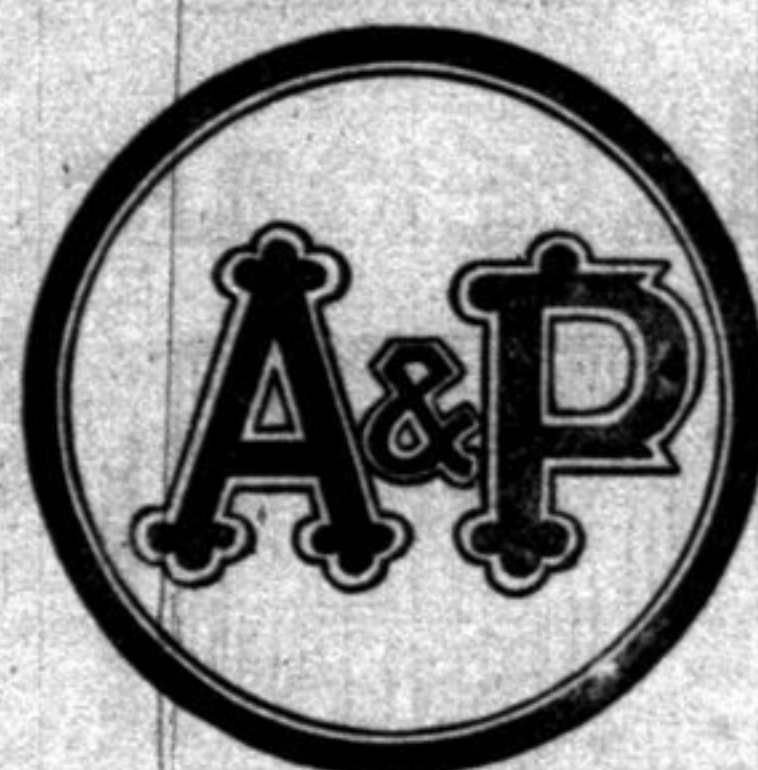
Call the Center, Highland Park 261 for help around your house. We always have men looking for work and generally can send you some one within a few hours. We are caring for an average of five or six calls a day now.
