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HIGH SCHOOL CONCERT SURPASSES PAST YEARS'

Miss Byrn deserves a good deal of praise for the work done by the dancing department of the high school. The costumes were worked out very accurately and the whole effect was beautiful. The dancers showed real technique. Deerfield was very fortunate to have Master William Carver Williams

here for the concert. His playing showed great talent and his tones were beautiful. His technique in Tarantelle by Popper was brilliant. Master Williams' poise was very unusual for so young an artist. It was worthy of a much older, more experienced player.

The work of the chorus and orchestra in "O Praise the Lord," Mendelssohn's magnificent work, deserves special mention. Many of the audience who thought the number a little ambitious for high school people gave it unreserved praise. The production was worthy of a much older, more experienced chorus.

The earnest and unflinching work of Mr. Conover and Mr. Bolle deserves the support of the whole community. They have worked many hours to make this concert a success for the people of the community. The concert leads us to believe the work of the musical department will very soon become, not only a thing of interest to the community, but an institution of real value and service to us.
