NORTH CHICAGO IS IN MORE TROUBLE

Cator Demands Receiver for City Water; Says Much Unaccounted for

Now comes trouble for the North Chicago water department, the one feature of the municipality to which the city dads pointed with pride during the recent smashup in city affairs.

Attorney Max Przyborski representing William H. Cator of Chicago, the father of North Chicago's water system, filed a petition in the circuit court demanding that a receiver be appointed by the court to handle the affairs of the water department until such time as the city is able to properly conduct its business, and that the water rates to consumers be increased until an existing deficit is canceled.

The petition also demands that the court enter an order demanding that the city of North Chicago be compelled to keep an adequate set of books showing the water production and consumption, and that Mr. Cator be supplied with quarterly reports of the water business as provided in the original contract which dates back to Dec. 16, 1921.

The petition states that the present water rate to consumers ranges from 35 cents to the private householders to 19 cents to the factories and big concerns. The complainant declares that it costs between 20 and 21 cents to pump the water and that the factory patronage is a losing proposition. Mr. Cator asks that a tentative rate of 35 cents to everybody be established until the deficit has been abolished, and that a uniform rate of 25 cents then be made effective.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A BOARD OF APPEALS IN AND FOR THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

The Council of the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, do ordain:

SECTION 1. That a Board of Appeals in and for the City of Highland Park is hereby established.

SECTION 2. That Raymond E. Herfman is hereby appointed Chairman of said Board of Appeals, and he shall hold his said office as said Chairman for a period of three years from and after the date of the passage of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. That J. J. Brand is hereby appointed a member of said Board of Appeals, and he shall hold his said office for a period of two years from and after the date of the passage of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. That Geo. R. Roberts is hereby appointed a member of said Board of Appeals, and he shall hold his said office for a period of one year from and after the date of the passage of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. That the said Board of Appeals shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as are now authorized under the terms of a certain Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois, entitled: "An Act to confer certain additional powers upon City Councils in cities, and Presidents and Boards of Trustees in villages and incorporated towns, concerning buildings and structures, the intensity of the use of lot areas, the classification of trades, industries, buildings and structures with respect to location and regulation, the creation of districts of different classes, and the establishment of regulations and restrictions applicable thereto," approved June 28, 1921, in force July 1, 1921.

SECTION 6. All members of the Appeal Board appointed under the provisions of this ordinance shall serve without compensation.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.
