INQUEST IN CLAVEY ACCIDENT YESTERDAY

VERDICT IS DRAWN UP

Jury Declares That Obstruction of View Kept Williams From Seeing Approaching Train

The inquest in the deaths of Earl Lee, Frank Bach, Robert McGann, Olaf Peterson and Arthur Williams, who were killed Monday, June 5, when the truck in which they were riding, owned by the Clavey Nursery Co., was struck by a Chicago and Northwestern train, was held yesterday afternoon at the prior undertaking establishment. Following is a copy of the jury's verdict in the death of Arthur Williams of Highland Park, which was practically the same in the other four cases: We, the undersigned, jurors, sworn to inquire into the death of Arthur Williams, on oath do find that he came to his death by injuries received when a truck owned by F. D. Clavey, Deerfield township, in which he was driving, was struck by a south bound passenger train of the Chicago and Northwestern railway, on or about 8:30 a. m., June 5, 1922.

After hearing all of the testimony and visiting the scene of the accident we find that there is more or less obstruction of the view of the track to the north by a combination of trees and telegraph poles and that, in our opinion, he failed to observe the approaching train. This accident occurred at the intersection of the Chicago and Northwestern railway tracks and Clavey road in Deerfield township, Lake County, Illinois.
