### CHICAGO COMPANY OPENS OFFICE HERE

**GREAT GROWTH ASSURED**  
Middle West to Keep Large Amount of Money from Going to Eastern Firms

Many millions of dollars have been going East from Chicago and the Middle West to enrich life insurance companies. It is a matter of statistical record that more than one billion dollars of life insurance is carried by citizens of Illinois in Eastern life insurance organizations.

The company has just received permission to write business in Indiana and has also applied for admittance into Iowa and expects in the near future to be operating in approximately fourteen different states.

While the Chicago National Life has only been doing business since January 1, it has close to six million dollars' worth of business on its books, and is writing practically all forms of life insurance. This is indeed good news to a great many of the citizens of Highland Park owing to the fact that a great many of the prominent people who are interested financially in this company, and are pulling together with the sole object in view of giving Illinois a much needed and looked for life insurance company.
