GROSS POINT TEAM DEFEATS LOCAL ELKS

VISITORS TAKE BACON

Several B. P. O. E. Players in Poor Shape But Put up Good Fight Against the Visitors

The Elks were defeated by the New Trier Pioneers of Gross Point last Sunday 5 to 4 in the best game of ball seen on the home diamond for some time. Over 500 saw the game. Both Hessler and Stremmel pitched good ball. Hessler having the edge on his opponent, but the breaks of the game went to Stremmel. Gross Point made only 8 hits. White was not in condition to catch, having received three foul tips on one hand in the twilight game at Evanston. Wohlbruck went into the game in no condition to play. White replaced him in the third inning. Hise was behind the bat in White's place. De Long was moved over to short and Pelnar was placed at third.

The Elks will travel to Gross Point next Sunday to play this team a return game.
The game by innings follows:
First — Walliser tries to bunt — out Hise to Clark. Tom Quinn after trying to lay down two of Hessler's fast ones drove one for two bases down the third base line. Becker drove one to Greenslade who after making a nice stop pitched wild to Clark. Quinn score. Becker took second. Gorman strikes out — Borrie-Chelner to Clark. 1 run, 1 hit, 1 error.

Highland Park — Wohlbruck beats out infield hit. Williams flies to Stremmel. Wohlbruck steals second and goes to third on Clark out Becker to Taul. Hise flies to Taul. No runs, 1 hit.

Second — Taul singles to short center. Pat Quinn after fouling a couple of Hessler's fast one hits a Texas leaguer behind 1st. Mahoney trying to bunt, popped a fly to Hessler who doubled out Quinn through Clark. Stremmel strikes out.

2 hits.
Highland Park — Wayman out Stremmel to Taul. Pelnar out same route. De Long out Becker to Taul. No hits.

Third — Walliser out to 3. Tom Quinn safe on 2nd when Wohlbruck tips judges his fly. Takes third on a balk by Hessler. De Long lets Becker's roller go through him. Quinn scores. Gorman strikes out for a second time. Borrie out Hessler to Clark. 1 run, no hits, 2 errors.

Highland Park. Greenslade out Borrie to Taul. Hessler flies to Taul. White batting for Wohlbruck, was out Stremmel to Taul. No hits, no errors.

Fourth — Taul out Hessler to Clark. Pat Quinn out same route. Mahoney out Greenslade to Clark. No hits.

Williams beats out infield hit. Clark trying to bunt popped a fly to Stremmel. Hise hits into double play Becker to Walliser to Taul.

1 hit.
Fifth — Stremmel out Hessler to Clark. Walliser looked at two bad ones, then foul tips one of Hessler's fast ones, injuring Hise who was catching for Highland Park. Walliser strikes out. Quinn flies to White. No hits.

Wayman strikes out. Pelnar safe when Maroney drops third strike hitting Pelnar with ball. De Long single to center. Pelnar racing to third scores when Quinn return throw goes into crowd at third base. De Long holding third on account of ground rules Greenslade out Walliser to Taul. Hessler doubles to R. F. scoring De Long. White out Stremmel to Taul.

Sixth — Becker out Hessler to Clark. Gorman gets base on balls 1st issued by Hessler. Borrie hits into double play. Pelnar to Greenslade to Clark. No hits.

Highland Park — William single over second. Clark bunts Stremmel making fast recovery throws to Taul beating Clark. Taul throws to Walliser beating Williams who did not start for second thinking Clark bunt would be caught. Hise singles over second. Wayman hits Hise with grounder on way to second.

2 hits, no runs.
Seventh — Taul out to De Long, Quinn out to Wayman. Mahoney strikes out.

Highland Park — Pelnar safe on first when Mahoney drops third strike. De Long flies out to Taul. Greenslade flies out to Gorman. No hits.

Eighth — Stremmel singles to center. Walliser out Hise to Clark. Stremmel taking second. Quinn safe on 1st when Greenslade fumbles roller. Becker strikes out. Gorman does likewise for 3rd time. 1 hit, 1 error, no runs.

Highland Park — Hessler out Becker to Taul. White was safe when Borrie fumbles fast grounder. Clark out Walliser to Taul. Hise out Borrie to Taul. No hits, 2 errors.

Ninth — Borrie fouls to Hise. Taul singles to center. Hise tries to catch Taul at second his throw being wild goes by second. Taul going to third. Quinn gets base on balls. Taul scores on Mahoney grounder. De Long throw being late. Quinn scores when Pelnar fumbles Stremmel roller. Mahoney scores on past ball. Walliser gets base on balls. Quinn strikes out 3 runs, 1 hit, 2 errors.

Highland Park — Wayman singles to center. Pelnar forces Wayman at second. De Long triples to left. Pelnar scoring. De Long scores on past ball. Greenslade strikes out. Hessler out Stremmel to Taul. 2 runs, 2 hits, 1 error.

STEIN LOSES TO MARINE

Boxing Bouts at Fort Sheridan Tuesday Night Were Well Fought; Carter Beats Wilson

Jack Stein, fighting against extreme odds, including height, weight and reach, put up the gamest battle of his career Tuesday night at Fort Sheridan.

It was rather amusing to see the steel-hearted little soldier enter the ring with Tommy Gooding, a marine, who outweighed him by about 15 pounds and towering over him about 4 inches. Before the first gong rang, many felt sorry for Stein, as though he was about to be executed, wondering how he could smile in the face of almost certain massacre. When the gong rang for the first round, Stein was still smiling and surprised every one by carrying the fight to Gooding, outboxing him and rocking Gooding with every punch.

He led in every round, and in the fourth round, had Gooding on the verge of a knockout with a right cross to the heart, and at the same time cutting a big gash in Gooding's eye and closing the other optic.

However, Gooding appeared to be too strong for Stein, and in the fifth round made a strong comeback, and caught a lucky haymaker on Jack's jaw, which caused him to go down on his knees for a short count. On arising, they both fell into a clinch, and some hot infighting followed, Gooding having the best of Stein on account of his weight. The referee broke them, and it was imminent that Stein was weakening. His eyes became glassy and it became apparent that the end was near. Gooding, taking advantage of the situation, swung a right hand on Stein's jaw. Jack struck the canvas hard, face forward, the referee commenced counting, it seemed unnecessary, for Stein was out. Then the bell rang. Stein's seconds rushed in and carried Jack to his corner, where they recuperated him in the minute interval.

Practically knocked out, Stein answered the last bell. He came out of the corner with his head bruised by the hard knockdown to fight the last round.

Stein raised his hands with much difficulty and attempted to carry the last round, even trying for a knockout. The husky marine pummeled Stein's face and stomach with hard rights. Stein still fought, however, and managed to remain on his feet until the gong. He lost, but was given great applause for putting up the gamest fight that was ever seen by any one.

Nick Carter, the hard hitting gob, easily bested Jack Wright of the Marines in the 8 round windup.

Carter had every round of the fight, nevertheless, a great deal of credit can be given the marine for putting up a game, losing battle.

In the last four rounds, Carter scored a knockout in each round, and two in the eighth. Wright stuck with him, however, and was game to the last core.

Carter is one of the best middleweights in this part of the country, and exposed punches that are to be respected.

Joey Slivver scored a knockout, by dropping Rolly Hinds of the army for a full count in the first round.

Both were fighting fiercely, and then Slivver dropped Hinds for the full count. It was the only unsatisfactory bout on the card.

Frankie Kuland and Charley Schwab put up a fast six round draw. There was considerable feeling between the gobs, however, they both missed many good punches.

Toots Cummings and Bob Little, who substituted for Johnny Massoth, also fought a draw. Nevertheless, it was believed Cummings should have been given a slight shade, in view of his aggressiveness, and cleaner hitting.

All in all, it was one of the best shows ever held at Fort Sheridan, and it proved one thing, that soldiers and sailors can put up some good fights, and no one went away disappointed.

The next bouts will be held July 13 in the big riding hall, with 36 rounds of boxing and a triple windup.

HIGHLAND PARK ELKS WIN TWILIGHT GAME

IN A FAST SIX INNINGS

The Game Was a Regular See Saw Ending in a Victory for the Locals; Score was 9 to 8

Williams started the game for Highland Park but on account of the weather was a little off his usual form. Montgomery started for Evanston and was somewhat wild being unable to find the plate.

Evanston was unable to score in their half of the first inning while the locals made five runs on a hit, three bases on balls and a couple of errors. There was nothing doing in the second inning. In the third however Evanston tied the score on three hits, two errors and two bases on balls. Jans, who took up the pitching for Evanston after the first inning, held Highland Park scoreless until the fifth inning. Evanston had gone ahead with a one run lead when Highland Park got to Jans for two runs on as many hits, going into the lead again. Evanston again assumed the lead by three hits which netted them two runs and with two men on base and no outs Captain White sent out an S. O. S. call. Hessler then relieved Williams, setting down the next three batters in order.

Highland Park being one run behind in the last inning opened with a man safe on first on an error by the second baseman, the shortstop made an error, allowing the next batter to reach first safely. Two on base and no outs. The next batter was retired by the Jans to Sullivan route when Hise after fouling six balls and watching three bad ones go by drove one of Jans' fast ones to short center bringing in two runs, the final score being Highland Park 9, Evanston 8.
