ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:
In the matter of the petition of the City of Highland Park for the ascertainment of the just compensation to be made for private property to be taken or damaged for the extension and opening of Dean Avenue for a public street, from the south line of Roger Williams Avenue to a line one hundred thirty-six (136) feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of the right of way of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company, by condemning therefor the following described land:

All that part of Lot 162 of South Highland Addition to the City of Highland Park beginning at the intersection of the Easterly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly with the Westerly line of Judson Avenue, at a point 42.6 feet Northwesterly from the Southeastery corner of Lot 162; thence Southwesterly 87.2 feet, more or less, to a point in the Southerly line of said Lot 162, 77.0 feet from said Southeastery corner; thence 108.0 feet to the Northwesterly corner of said lot; thence Northwesterly on the Westerly line of said Lot 15.6 feet to the intersection of the westerly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly with the Westerly line of said lot; thence Northwesterly along said Westerly line 30.5 feet to the Southeastery line of said Lot 161; thence Northwesterly along said Southeastery line 26.9 feet to the place of beginning.

Also, that part of the Southerly one-half of Lot 161 of South Highland Addition to the City of Highland Park, described as follows:—Beginning at the Southeastery corner of said Lot 161; thence Northwesterly along the Northwesterly line of said Lot 161, 15.6 feet to an intersection with the Westerly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly; thence Southwesterly along said Westerly line 30.5 feet to the Southeastery line of said Lot 161; thence Northwesterly along said Southeastery line 26.9 feet to the place of beginning.

Also, that part of the North one-half of Lot 164 of South Highland Addition to the City of Highland Park, described as follows:—Beginning at the Northeastery corner of said Lot 164; thence Southeastery along the Northeastery line of said Lot 164;

50.0 feet to the Southeastery corner of the North one-half of said Lot 164; thence Southwesterly along the center line Easterly and Westerly of said lot 164, 112.65 feet to an intersection with the Westerly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly; thence Northwesterly along the Westerly line of Dean Avenue 99.63 feet to an intersection with the Northwesterly line of said Lot 164; thence Northwesterly along the Northwesterly line of said Lot 164, 26.9 feet to the point of beginning.

Also, that part of the South one-half of said Lot 164, of South Highland Addition to the City of Highland Park, described as follows:—Beginning at a point 38.6 feet Northwesterly from the Southeastery corner of Lot 164, said point of beginning being the intersection of the Northeastery line of Lot 164 with the Easterly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly; thence Northwesterly along the Northwesterly line of said Lot 164, 11.9 feet to the Northeastery corner of the South one-half of said Lot 164; thence Southwesterly along the center line Easterly and Westerly of said Lot 164, 112.65 feet to an intersection with the Westerly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly; thence Southwesterly along the Westerly line of said Dean Avenue extended, 3.77 feet to a point on a line 70 feet Northwesterly from and parallel with the Northwesterly line of said Lot 164 and 11.9 feet Southeastery from the Northwesterly line of said Lot 164; thence Southeastery along said line 70 feet from and parallel to the Southwesterly line of Lot 164, 48.1 feet to an intersection with the Southerly line of said Lot 164; thence Northwesterly along the Southeastery line of said Lot 164, 48.8 feet to an intersection with the Southeastery line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly; said point being 67.1 feet Southwesterly of the Southeastery corner of Lot 164; thence Northwesterly along the Easterly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly 77.4 feet to the point of beginning.

Also, that part of Lot 165 of South Highland Addition to the City of Highland Park, described as follows:—Beginning at a point in the Northerly line of Lot 165, 70.0 feet Easterly from the Northwesterly corner of said lot; thence Southerly parallel with the Westerly line of said Lot 28.2 feet, more or less, to an intersection with the Easterly line of Dean Avenue extended Southwesterly; thence Northwesterly along said Easterly line extended 56.5 feet to the Northerly line of said Lot 165; thence Westerly along said Northerly line 48.8 feet, more or less, to the place of beginning, all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois. That in said proceedings for the purpose of making said improvement and of determining what property will be benefited thereby and the amount of such benefit, the estimated total cost of such improvement as shown by the estimate being the sum of Sixteen Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Five Dollars and no cents (\$16,475.00); Commissioners were duly appointed by the said Court to investigate and report the just compensation to be made for private property to be taken or damaged for said improvement and also what real estate will be benefited by such improvement and the amount of such benefits to each parcel of land benefited thereby, and that said Commissioners duly made a special assessment to raise the cost of such improvement and duly filed their report in the office of the Clerk of the said Court on the Fifth day of June, A. D. 1922, which report shows the total cost of said improvement to be the sum of Sixteen Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$16,475.00).

Thereupon a summons issued out of said Court against the defendants above named, returnable at the County Court House in the City of Waukegan, in said County on the Seventh day of July, A. D. 1922 as is by law required, which proceeding is still pending. Now, unless you, the said defendants, shall be and appear before the said County Court of Lake County, Illinois, at the Court House in the City of Waukegan, in said County on or before the Seventh day of July, A. D. 1922, and plead, answer or demur to the petitioner's petition, or object to the report of the Commissioners aforesaid, the same and the matters therein charged and stated will be taken as confessed, and a judgment entered in accordance with the said report and the prayer of the said petition.
