### GALLOWES STILL STAND DESPITE HIS RESPITE

Sheriff Green Will Keep Borrowed  
Gibbet Until Case  
Is Settled

Though Ignatz Potz plays cards in his cell in the county jail, reprieved for 60 days from his sentence to hang, the gallows on which he was to have paid the supreme penalty still looms dark and menacing in the attic of the court house, almost over his head.

Sheriff Elmer Green has decided not to tear down the gallows, at least until he consults H. C. W. Laubenheimer, assistant to Sheriff Peters of Cook county. Last Thursday night, when the news of Gov. Small's action in giving Potz a stay for the murder of Motorcycle Policeman William Peterson, Assistant Jailor Lorenz Meisterheim advised the sheriff to have the gibbet taken apart, as in 60 days before Potz must again face death someone might trifle with the apparatus and get it out of order.

Sheriff Green has put double locks on all doors leading to the attic, and will await word from Laubenheimer before he does anything further. It is probable that the gallows will be left standing until the sheriff has definite word as to whether or not Potz is to hang.

Cook county will not need the structure, as there is a gallows in the county jail in Chicago which will hang three men at once, and it is that one which is used in most executions.

Potz, now that he has been reprieved, has returned to the regular routine he followed until the day before he was supposed to die. He spends a good deal of his time playing cards. He has recovered from the dejection into which he sank when he learned that the state supreme court had refused his counsel's plea for a stay of execution Thursday, and is more carefree than a number of the bootleggers and blind pig keepers who are lingering behind the bars for stays of from 30 to 90 days. Potz jokes with his jailers and with his fellow prisoners.

### ARDEN SHORE READY FOR SUMMER GUESTS

Grounds and Buildings Put in  
Shape for Season; Several  
Articles Needed

Arden Shore, the fresh air camp at Lake Bluff, is nearly ready for its first quota of 500 guests from Chicago's congested districts. The grounds are in order, the tent man is busy repairing and putting up tents, fresh paint has brightened things here and there and everything is being done to insure a good time for the mothers and children who will soon come trooping out for their own vacation of the year.

The camp directors, because of past happy experiences, have come to depend upon their friends along the North Shore to supply deficiencies in equipment that arise every year. Many an attic and tool house has given up long unused treasures that have perfectly filled a need at Arden Shore. So the superintendent sends the following list of articles needed, with the hope that those who have these things and no longer use them will feel minded to give them to Arden Shore.

Lawn mower, mimeograph or duplicator, chairs of all kinds, furniture, in general, clothing, bathing suits, bath towels, baby carriages, toys and books.

### RIVER FOREST HAS ELECTRIFIED HOUSE

Every Appliance for Comfort  
and Convenience Installed  
In New Building

Construction of a completely electrified house in which, in addition to a comprehensive system of lighting provision is made for the use of appliances for cooking, performing all necessary domestic work and adding to comfort and convenience is to be started at once at River Forest, a suburb west of Oak Park. The wiring plans were made by a committee of contractors and representatives of the Public Service company which will supply the electrical energy required.

The electric lighting arrangement provides for the use of both chandeliers and side brackets and many table and floor lamps to contribute to the general decorative effect. Reflector lights are fixed over the pictures. There are lights in every closet, on the turning of all stairs, on the porches, in the coal bins, furnace room and store rooms. There will be in fact, not a dark corner in the house.

The equipment is supplied to operate an electric refrigerator, an ice cream freezer, an electric ironing machine, an electric washing machine, an electric clothes dryer and electric irons in the laundry. There will be a large electric range in the kitchen together with an electric

percolator, iron, a utility motor for grinding cutlery, polishing silver, glassware, for beating eggs and butter, etc., and an exhaust fan to carry cooking odors outdoors. In the dining room there will be special wiring arrangements enabling the use of an electric coffee urn, toaster, chafing dish, grill and samovar. Several of these can be put in service at the same time. A wired tea cart will be part of the fittings of the room.

Upstairs, the installation includes easily accessible outlets for heating pads, curling irons, an electric shaving cup and movable heating devices. There will be electric cigar lighters in the living room, on the porch and in the billiard room, electric logs in the grates and a radio aerial on the roof. A master switch in the owner's bedroom controls the entire system in the house.

It is announced that when this house is finished it will be completely furnished. The electric appliances described and others besides will be put in their places and all will be put in operation for a few hours each day for a week during which time visitors will be allowed to inspect the premises.

### CHEMICAL COMPANY BUILDS IN WAUKEGAN

Abbott Laboratories Will Move  
To New Location; To Employ  
2,000 People

A mammoth chemical concern, the Abbott laboratories, will center their entire business in Waukegan within the next year according to the statement of one of the head officials.

By the time that the buildings are completed there will be between 1,500 and 2,000 employes working in the plant and at least a force of 200 salesmen on the road.

The centering of the business will mean the construction of fifteen or more buildings, two of them structures of three stories. One will be 400x300 feet while another will be in the neighborhood of 200x150 feet. The floor space will probably reach 500,000 square feet, five times as large as the plant the company is now operating near the Northwestern tracks in Ravenswood.

The report that the plant would be centered in Waukegan became certain with the offering of the Ravenswood buildings for sale. An advertisement, covering a page in the Chicago Commerce, a publication of the Commercial association there, states that the entire plant, of 100,000 square feet of floor space, will be offered for sale as a manufacturing building.

About 600 laborers will be employed in the plant and a force of stenographers, expert chemists, clerks and other office help will bring the personnel of the industry up to the 2000 mark.

The Abbott laboratories specialize in chemicals, biological instruments, and pharmaceuticals. One of their specialties is the manufacture of German patent pharmaceuticals which were allowed to be manufactured by the government by certain factories during the war. Other factories gave up this special work and the Abbott company is the only concern in this country now placing these products

on the market. The big demand for them and the fact that they have brought the standard up to a higher grade has received favorable comment from physicians throughout the country.

The work on the present buildings is being rushed forward at a high rate of speed, according to the officials' report. It is almost certain that full construction will be completed within the course of the year and that the plant will be operating at capacity.

### POTZ' FATE RESTS WITH PARDON BOARD

Supreme Court's Decision Believed to Have Ended Hope  
For Him There

The battle to free Ignatz Potz, condemned slayer of Motorcycle Policeman William Peterson, ended with the courts last Thursday afternoon and with the sixty day reprieve granted early Friday morning by Gov. Small, now shifts to the chamber of the governor and the board of pardons. The decision handed down Thursday by the supreme court settled the question for all time as far as the jurisdiction of the courts here is concerned.

There is a possibility that the matter may be thrust out before the board of pardons to have the sentence commuted to life imprisonment. Appeal may be made to Governor Small for further action. Just what the course may be has not yet been definitely announced by the condemned man's attorneys. One thing is certain, however, there is one road ahead which may be taken in different ways. Eventually the battle will end with the governor or the board.

Attorney Lester Williams, after his appeal which won further life for Potz, sought the quietness of his room and the comfort of sleep. Not a minute is to be lost, however, in the legal struggle to cheat the gallows. The plans are stretched on the table. The next move is yet to be announced.
