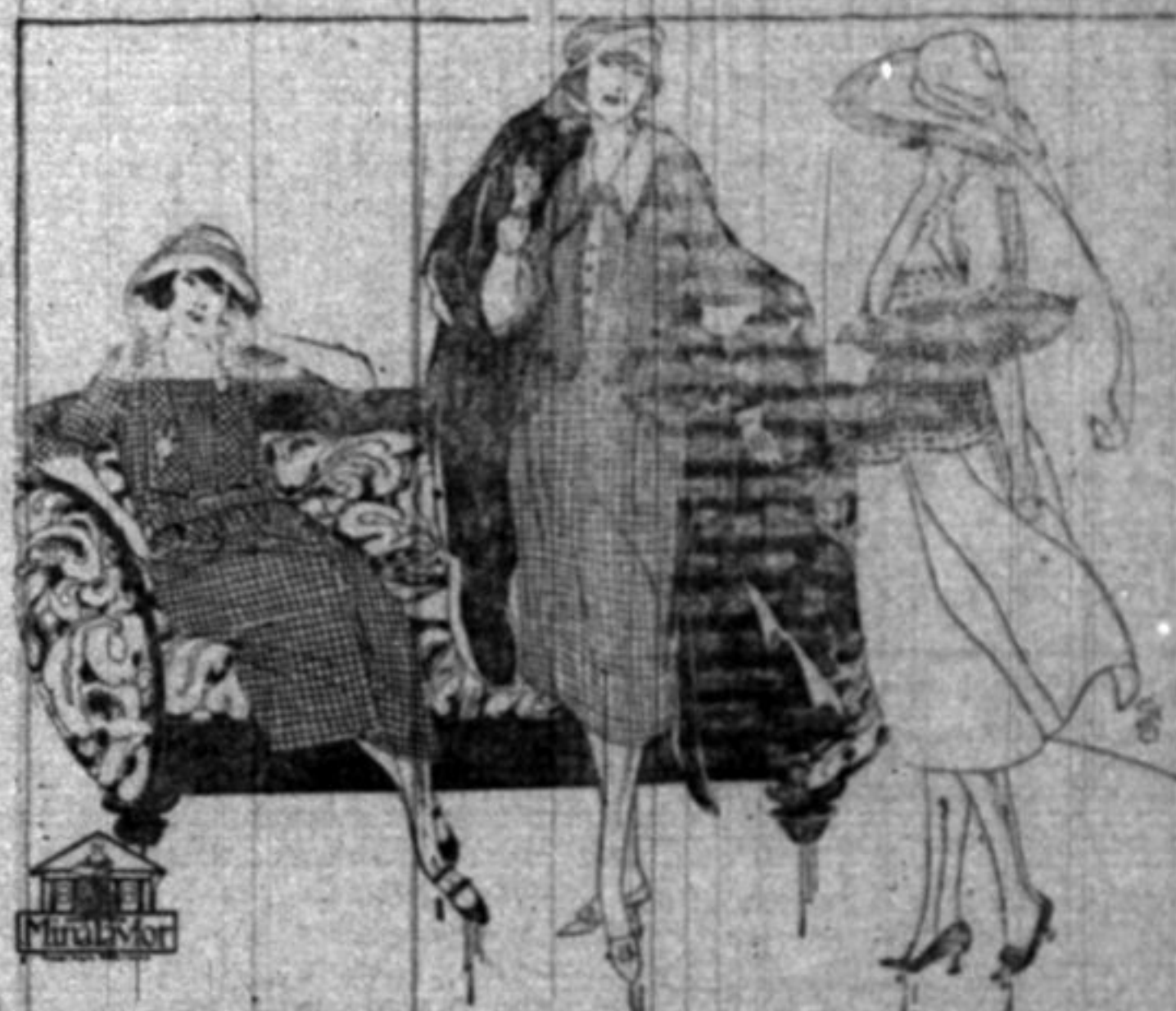

GOING BROKE TO PROVE IT

The Breeders Journal at Spencer, Iowa, has been sold at auction to satisfy the creditors. It is the same old story told to farmers and breeders but the pity of it is that the falsity of the claims could not be proven and the stockholders convinced until it was too late and they had lost their money. The promoters of the Breeders Journal told the farmers that they were being overcharged by newspapers and job offices. They

opened up for business, cut prices and made newspaper men look like robbers—for awhile. Anybody can run a business down hill, but eventually things have to be paid for, and if right prices have not been charged they go into bankruptcy.

Every newspaper in Blue Earth county has suffered from the same ill cause. Newspaper men know what printing costs are, and if stockholders of a bankrupt newspaper want to put up the difference they are welcome to the glory.

The business man who is incompetent to figure correctly is always a detriment to his competitor, because he places the latter in the wrong light—makes the public think he is a robber. When he explains that he cannot do business on that basis, the customer asks, "How is it that your competitor is able to?" The fact is his competitor is not able to, but we have to wait until he goes broke to prove it.

It is just the same in the dry goods business, the grocery business or any other line. The legitimate dealer knows what his expenses are, and just what he must have to continue his business, and he knows that his competitor must go broke in time.—The Publishers Review.
