The local Elks baseball team traveled to Gross Point last Sunday, only to be defeated by the strong New Trier Pioneers 8 to 6. This cold wind was also the cause of both pitchers being hit hard. Gross Point jumped on Hessler for 3 runs in the fourth. H. P. then came back in the fifth at Stremmel for 5 runs. Gross Point again tied score in the sixth. H. P. took the lead by one run in the seventh. Gross Point followed with 3 runs. This gave them a two run lead which the Elks didn't overcome. The Elks, however, was not defeated until the last man was out in the ninth, with men on second and third. It was up to Greenslade, but the break of the game went against Highland Park. PUBLISH RULES FOR BARNYARD GOLF GAME

For the benefit of beginners at barnyard golfing, the following rules of the game in skeleton form, as adopted by the United States Horse Shoe Pitching Association are given.

REGULATION GAMES

A standard regulation game shall consist of 50 points and the contestant scoring this number after all shoes have been pitched shall be declared to winner.

In case of any dispute or where the rules do not specifically cover a disputed point the referee or committee in charge shall have full power and final jurisdiction.

PITCHING DISTANCE

Forty feet from stake to stake.

FOUL LINE

Three feet in front of stake.

SCORING RULES

Any shoe that does not remain within six inches of the stake shall not be counted or scored. The closest shoe to the stake (within six inches) shall score one point. If both shoes are closer than the opponents they shall score two points.

RINGERS

Shoes must encircle the stake far enough to permit a straight edge to touch both heel calks and clear the stake.

A ringer shall score three points. A ringer and a closest shoe shall score four points. A double ringer shall score six points. In case of contestant having a ringer the next closest shoe shall score. If each contestant has a double ringer, both double ringers are cancelled and no points scored. Contestants having two ringers and his opponent one the pitcher having 2 ringers shall score three points. In case of all shoes tied no count.

LEANERS

Shoe leaning against stake counts as the nearest shoe, one point.

ROTATION GROUP

In each group each pitcher will pitch each other one game. Same procedure shall prevail in the finals.

MORE BOUTS JULY 13 AT FORT SHERIDAN

34 ROUNDS SCHEDULED

Old Favorites Will Again Appear in Ring for American Legion; Special Trains For Fans

Fight fans who witnessed the last Fort Sheridan bouts between the service men, were very much pleased with the card, and are now convinced that service men can fight and give the public a real run for their money. Jack Stein, boxer-promoter, is arranging a lengthy program for July 13th, which will be held under the auspices of the General Crook Post of the American Legion at Fort Sheridan.

There will probably be 34 rounds of boxing, with a triple windup of 8 rounds each. Efforts will be made to match Buck Krieger, who is nicknamed the "Dempsey of the Army", and Joey Slivver, the sensational gub, who is making a fast reputation hereabouts, for the main go.

This bout would be very attractive and would draw well from both Great Lakes and Fort Sheridan. Slivver has scored two consecutive knockouts at the Fort.

However, Krieger is a former pupil of Goits Doig, the famous middleweight, and like Slivver, is both a fighter and boxer, and carries a wicked punch in his right hand, and it is believed by Jack Stein, the youthful promoter, Krieger would force Slivver to extend himself, and may beat Slivver.

Buck Krieger performed at Fort Sheridan last winter in the Corps Area Meets, where he took on Sam Fredericks of the 2nd infantry, one of the hardest hitting boxers in the army, and who put over a k. o. on Sergeant Jimmy Flynn, the present champion of the 6th Corps Area.

It was believed at the time that no one could cope with Fredericks' maulers, however, Krieger fought him to a fast six round draw and went an extra round for the decision, and every one who witnessed that bout, will believe today Krieger won that fight.

Nevertheless, it would be an interesting go between two skillful boxers who can hit as well, and alone would be worth the price of admission.

Nick Carter, the hard hitting mauler, may be in the other windup with Jack Lally, another hard hitting sailor who hails from Chicago.

Carter still remains to be beaten and at present no one has been found who can turn the trick, however, Jimmy Murry, Great Lakes matchmaker, believes that Lally, who is in the radio department at Chicago, can give Carter a merry go for eight rounds, anyway, it would be interesting to watch any one give Carter a real fight and similar to the one Curtis gave him.

The fans who saw Jack Stein in action against Gooding, where he put up a game losing fight with extreme odds against him, want to see him in action with some good boy around his own height and weight. At least we hope Jack can find some one suitable and if Stein takes the other windup the fans who were there before have promised to come back to see him go.

It is being contemplated to hold the future shows in the big riding hall, where accommodations can be made to permit as many people as want to come. Plans are under way to increase the seating capacity to approximately 1500. The riding hall is just the place for the bouts, it is large and spacious, which causes it to be cool and fight fans will be enabled to witness the bouts with ease and comfort. The prices are also going to be sliced again, as it is not the idea of the fort management to make it a "get-rich quick scheme", but charge just enough to pay the expenses and have a little over to furnish other entertainment for the service men, never the less, it would be far from the thoughts of the fans to kick about the price when they are anxious to see good fights and such as the soldiers and gobs can put up.
