INSANITY PLEA IS POTZ'S ONLY CHANCE

That Ignatz Potz, murder of Motorcycle Policeman William Petersen of Winthrop Harbor, who was to have been hanged June 16, but who received a sixty-day reprieve from Governor Len Small, has an exceedingly slim chance of escaping the gallows eventually, is the opinion of Asst. States Attorney S. H. Block.

According to Mr. Block there always is the chance that a pardon or commutation of sentence may come from the state executive; aside from this he says that practically the only chance left Potz is to file a petition in court asking that he be declared

insane, the course taken by several convicted murderers in Cook county. "I am inclined to believe that this is the course his attorneys will take," Mr. Block said today. "If the petition is filed late and the hearing is granted by the court it might have the effect of delaying the hanging another week. Personally I do not look for the governor to intervene again."

"Likewise I do not believe the Supreme court would consent to review the evidence because of the decisive way they ruled in affirming the judgment of the Circuit court. For the same reason I do not look for the state pardon board to take any action. An insanity plea seems to be the only chance left for Potz."

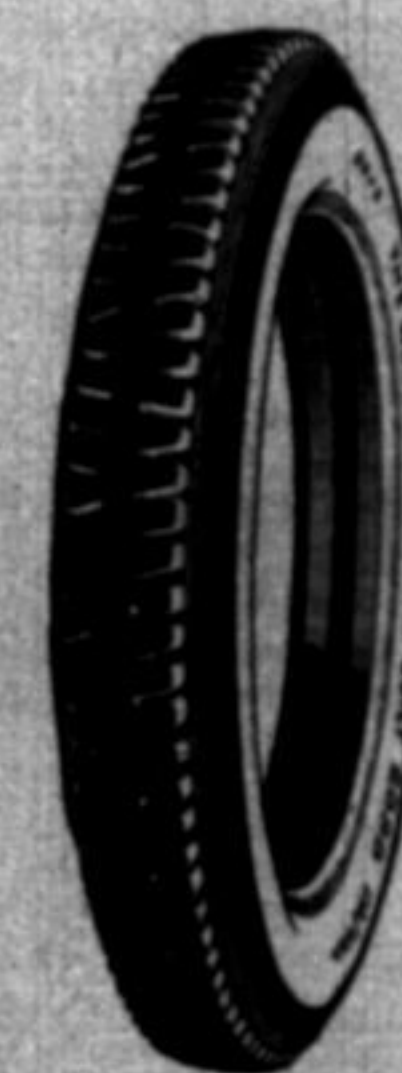
