HIGHLAND PARK MAN FOUND DEAD IN LAKE

The body of Burrell P. Treat, 49, of Highland Park, was found floating in the lake near Oak street pier, Chicago, last Friday, after having been missing from his rooms at the Moraine hotel since the preceding Sunday. Mr. Treat was an insurance man. His wife is said to live in Rockford, Ill., and their son is a student at Princeton university. Police believe that the man jumped into the lake near here and that the body was washed to the vicinity of Chicago. No effort had been made to disguise the identity of the man. Cards and letters found in his coat pocket bore his name and address at the Moraine hotel. The body showed no signs of violence.

MAMMOTH MONUMENT FOR ELWOOD HAYNES

Automobile World Will Celebrate Twenty-eighth Anniversary Of Great Invention

Final plans for the gigantic July Fourth celebration in honor of the twenty-eighth anniversary of the initial trip of America's first mechanically successful automobile on the Pumpkinville Pike near Kokomo, Indiana,—the day when the automotive world will do honor to Elwood Haynes as the father of the American automobile industry—are now rapidly being completed.

The celebration is taking on a national aspect, and hundreds of the nation's leading men will journey to Kokomo on July Fourth to do homage to Mr. Haynes as one of the greatest inventors of the age.

Today Mr. Haynes was driven out to the monument works to witness the progress of the workmen who are cutting the inscription on the huge memorial monument which is to be dedicated to him and to his notable invention.

The monument itself, although simple in design as befits the character and life of the man to whom it will be dedicated, is a work of rare beauty. The base is a solid block of New York granite, while the shaft, which will carry the inscription and the Stellite tablet, is a huge block of red St. Cloud granite. These particular species of stone were chosen because of their enduring qualities.

Mounted on the shaft, at a slight angle to make reading easier, will be a beautiful tablet of solid Stellite, the new metal invented by Mr. Haynes.
