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ANOTHER CROSSING ACCIDENT

Grade crossings claimed two more victims last Saturday night when a car from Chicago was struck by a train on the Chicago and North Western railway a half mile west of Lake Bluff, killing Lester Calhoun, 4156 North Crawford avenue, Chicago, and fatally injuring James Walsh, 4201 North Crawford avenue. A third member of the party was seriously injured.

These boys were on their way to Lake Beulah, Wis., for a short vacation. They failed to see the train approaching until the locomotive was upon them. There was no escape. Scarcely a month ago several men were killed in a similar accident on the same railroad at Clavey road south of Highland Park.

The "Cross Crossings Cautiously" campaign and all other safety propaganda will not change human nature nor sharpen human eyes. Some lives will be saved, but there will always be grade crossing accidents as long as there are grade crossings. The C. & N. W. railroad crosses Waukegan road just west of Lake Bluff. This is only one of many grade crossings on highways in this vicinity. It is indeed a pity that the same civilization which puts high voltage wires safely over the heads of the people doesn't also put the trains there.

AN EVIL CONDITION

Recent analyses of lake water at the bathing beach have revealed the fact that it is polluted and unsafe, according to the Board of Health. Various reasons for this condition have been advanced. One very evident evil, which may be a cause of the impure water, was discovered this week by a representative of The Press, in an investigation at the water front. It was found that the sewer basin at the foot of the Park avenue ravine had become clogged in some manner, and that some of the sewage was leaking out into the ravine, and emptying in the lake. A fairly large pool of sewer water lay on the beach, a breeding place for disease and mosquitos. This condition should be remedied.

KEEP FIT

Keeping fit is the duty of every worker to himself and to his job. Here is a list of things recommended by Dr. Royal S. Copeland, health commissioner of New York City, who urges their adoption by all who desire to maintain their physical and mental powers at high standard:

Spend ten minutes a day in setting-up exercises.

WORLD MAY END IN 1925 SAYS VOLIVA

Zion Faithful Told That Christian Dispensation is Fast Closing

That time of times when the earth shall exist no longer is fast approaching in the opinion of Wilbur Glenn Voliva, overseer of Zion.

In fact, the overseer announced last Friday, the year 1925 might easily see the end of time; at the pace the world is now traveling.

Voliva, addressing the faithful on the opening of the "twenty-second feast of tabernacles," in Shiloh tabernacle, explained that there "is a universal expectation of a world-wide catastrophe."

"I, personally, know that the Christian dispensation is closing," the overseer said. "We believe the church is complete and the fulness of the Gentiles will then come."
