

**ON LOOKOUT FOR THE CHINCH BUG**

**Pest Has Not Appeared Here Yet, But Has Invaded Central Illinois**

Lake county farmers are genuinely concerned over reports reaching here from other communities regarding the damage being done by chinch bugs, and are keeping an active watch so that they may take prompt means to eradicate the pest should it appear. So far as known the pest has not yet invaded Lake county but is liable to appear at any time.

The following telegram from Springfield tells of inroads elsewhere:

Springfield, Ill., July 8.—Chinch bugs are making heavy inroads on grain crops of Illinois farmers, particularly in the central section of the state.

Reports from Moultrie county are that spring wheat is heavily infested, and rust has added to the damage done by bugs. Some fields of corn mixed with volunteer wheat and fields of wheat and rye are badly damaged in Champaign county where preparations are being made for creosote barriers in case the bugs move from infested areas into other corn.

Farm advisers in Adams county are urging those who have not finished planting or who are replanting to plant soybeans with corn or to use the chinch bug resistant varieties of corn. Barriers may also be requested.

In Dewitt county old chinch bugs have moved out of the wheat to adjoining corn fields.

**ZION OVERSEER BARS KNICKERS FOR WOMEN**

**Finds Passage in Bible Upon Which to Base a New Ordinance**

A giant bulletin board, to be erected along the principal highway through Zion, will announce to the world that women can not foist themselves on the city of Zion in men's apparel, Wilbur Glenn Voliva, overseer, announced last Saturday.

Those of the fair sex who venture into Zion clad in male raiment are not only liable to arrest for violation of an ordinance, but are also likely to be enveloped in a blanket and rushed to jail, according to Voliva's orders. The signboard will contain a Bible quotation and a warning. The signboard will be from Deuteronomy xxiii, 5:

"The women shall not wear that which pertaineth unto man, neither shall a man put on a woman's garment; for whosoever doeth these things is an abomination unto Jehovah thy God."

**CHINDBLOOM AGAINST NAVAL STATION CUT**

A statement issued by Congressman Carl R. Chindbloom criticizes the appropriation allowed by the Navy department for the maintenance of the Great Lakes naval station, and urges that Congress permit both a bigger appropriation and larger training facilities at the naval station.

The present appropriation provides

only for the maintenance of the two trade schools at Great Lakes under the present reduced complement of the naval service. The statement of the representative points out the necessity of maintaining a seaman school at the Great Lakes for the training of seamen from the Middle West, where some of the navy's best material has been obtained.

It has been urged that the Great Lakes station be maintained on an equal basis as the two stations on the coasts at Hampton Roads and at San Francisco.

**TWO KILLED WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO**

**Light Truck Collides with Locomotive at Crossing Near Lake Bluff**

Two are dead, one injured, and two unhurt as a result of an accident at the Waukegan road crossing of the Chicago and North Western railroad about a half mile west of Lake Bluff at nine o'clock Saturday night. Five Chicago boys were driving a light truck to Lake Bluff, Wis. As they approached the grade crossing they failed to see a fast train approaching. Russell G. Fair, 4447 North Crawford avenue and James Nolan, 3852 West Monroe street, who were on the back of the truck, jumped to safety. Lester Calhoun, 17, 4156 North Crawford avenue was decapitated. James Walsh, 18, 4201 North Crawford avenue died Sunday night in the McAllister hospital at Waukegan. Daniel O'Rourke, 19, 1673 Hollywood avenue, suffered a compound fracture of his right arm and will recover. An inquest was conducted Monday afternoon by Coroner J. L. Taylor.
