LIFE TERM FOR MURDERER

Pardon Board Sanctions Gov. Small's Act in Commuting Potz' Sentence; Other News

The Lake County National Bank of Libertyville is now preparing for the erection of its banking house on the site just north of the present quarters. Work has already started in the wrecking of the old frame buildings formerly occupied by the Army and Navy store and Flagg's barber shop.

Plans for the new building disclose a structure of architectural beauty fitted with every modern appointment for the convenience and satisfaction of the firm's banking clientele. The building will cover the entire frontage on Milwaukee avenue and will be 85 feet deep. Construction will be of brick and terra cotta.

The estimated cost of the improvement is between \$60,000 and \$70,000 and the entire building will be used for banking purposes. Construction will be pushed right along with the hope of completion by the first of the year.

Upon recommendation of the division of pardons and paroles, Gov. Len Small last week commuted the sentence of Ignatz Potz to life imprisonment.

The board heard arguments for the death sentence for Potz and recommended that he be given life imprisonment.

The gallows which were brought here to be used in the execution of Ignatz Potz were taken back to Chicago last week on Supervisor Hutton's truck.

A. R. Drennan, auditor for Sangamon county, arrived in Waukegan last Friday afternoon to inspect the bills submitted by Lake county for the trial of Len Small.

"As a whole," he said, "the bill is much less than I had expected it to be. Less than \$10,000 is a very reasonable figure for a case requiring so much time and so much outside help. I think that too many bailiffs were used, but otherwise I think Lake county conducted the trial in a very economical way."

Mr. Drennan stated that the cost of subsistence for the jury was much less than the cost in Sangamon county.

Men in three sections of Lake county last Friday were involved in liquor suits. State's Attorney A. V. Smith filed information against Gus Pasiewicz of North Chicago, George Cessar of St. James street, Waukegan and A. Czarzar of Fox Lake. All of the men are charged with possessing and selling intoxicating liquor.

Jack O'Connor, proprietor of a resort on Blarney Island, Grass Lake, appeared in circuit court Saturday and filed a bond of \$5,000 which permits him to reopen his place which was closed on an injunction charging him with violation of the prohibition law. Under the state law O'Connor forfeits the bond if he again sells liquor on the premises.

Hoping that some day Zion City's bad half mile of Sheridan road will be closed for construction, Charles E. Russell, county superintendent of highways, has started his men at work improving the Green Bay road through Waukegan, Benton and Newport townships. The road has been graded and smoothed and is now being oiled for the use of autoists who will be directed over the west road when Sheridan road is under construction in Zion and Waukegan.

With the exception of Grand avenue, all roads leading to the Green Bay road have been improved and are ready for the heavy traffic which will be directed over them if Voliva ever decides to pave their streets.

Both bids for the paving of the road through Zion have been thrown out and new bids will be received this week.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NORTH SHORE SANITARY DISTRICT APPROPRIATING MONEYS FOR THE CORPORATE PURPOSES TO BE EXPENDED DURING THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1, 1922, AND ENDING APRIL 30, 1923.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NORTH SHORE SANITARY DISTRICT:

Section 1. That the following amounts or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, and as may be needed, are hereby appropriated for the corporate purposes of the North Shore Sanitary District for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1922, and ending April 30, 1923. The purposes for which appropriations are made and the amounts appropriated for the various purposes are as follows:

For salary of President and Trustees	\$ 3,000.00
For salary of Clerk-Attorney and Treasurer	1,550.00
For salary of Superintendent	2,100.00
Office supplies, office maintenance, and office rent	600.00
Legal expense, court fees and costs, including special attorneys' fees, other than regular attorney	2,500.00
Acquisition of land and easements for sewage disposal plants and conduits at Highland Park	6,000.00
Construction of Lake Shore sewage disposal plant at Highland Park, including necessary conduits	60,000.00
Construction of sewage disposal tank south of Deerfield avenue, for District E in Highland Park, including construction of conduits	25,000.00
Construction of sewage disposal tank for Highland Park, including conduits	25,000.00
For reconstruction of sewage disposal plant at Lake Forest, including conduits	15,000.00
For construction of sewage disposal plant at Lake Bluff, including conduits	20,000.00
Reconstruction of sewage disposal plant at North Chicago, including conduits	10,000.00

Repairs on sewage disposal plant at Highland Park, for District C, including conduits 5,000.00
General engineering expense 12,500.00
Publishing and printing 1,000.00
Acquisition of sewage disposal plant property at Waukegan 30,000.00
Construction of sewage disposal plant at Waukegan, including conduits 100,000.00
Operation and maintenance of all sewage disposal plants 5,000.00
Maintenance equipment to be used in common by all plants 2,500.00

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the law.
