WORK TO COMMENCE ON MONSTER PLANT

Public Service Co. Will Erect Big Power Station at Waukegan

That actual work is soon to begin on the gigantic new electric power plant which the Public Service company is to start building on the flats east of the Northwestern railway at Waukegan, was indicated today when T. J. Stahl and Company announced that they had sold the electric company 18 lots, making a strip 150 feet wide from Sheridan road to North avenue across the Blumberg subdivision.

This is the first step toward acquiring a right of way from the new plant west to the Green Bay road and then south to Chicago, officials of the company said. The width of the strip is necessitated by the fact that the power lines will carry current of 132,000 volts, and thus must be run at some distance from other property.

It is understood that the Public Service company will construct two lines of steel towers on the right of way, to carry the high tension lines. These lines are to supply the territory west of here, as well as a large part of Chicago. Whether they will be run north or not has not been decided yet. Work on the new plant will be started within a month, according to the latest reports.

In the meantime, the added demands of the Waukegan industrial district have made it necessary for the company to make several improvements in its present station and lines at Waukegan. Probably the most important of these is the new "bus room" in the plant at the foot of Water street.

Increased activity in the North Chicago industrial district has led to the construction of an outdoor substation at Broadway and Commonwealth avenue, North Chicago. The substation will make it possible to supply more power for the new Abbott laboratories, the new Biflex addition and new power units at the North Chicago Hardware foundry.

GOVERNMENT DISPLAYS HAVE BEEN SHIPPED

Eighteen Models Will Show Development of Navy Since John Paul Jones

Chicago, Ill.—Government displays for the second annual international Pageant of Progress Exposition which will be held on the municipal pier here from July 29 to August 14, have been shipped and will arrive within the next few days, Col. Theodore Roosevelt, acting secretary of the navy, has advised Dr. C. St. Clair Drake, director of exhibits.

Col. Roosevelt informed Dr. Drake that he had ordered the shipment of eighteen models from the Brooklyn navy yard that will show the historic development of the navy from the days of John Paul Jones to the latest superdreadnaught. The exhibit will include replicas of the romantic frigates of the Revolutionary war; the Monitor of the Civil war, the first ironclads and the modern first class battleship.

The Smithsonian Institution exhibit, which is to show the development in water, land and air transportation, also is on the way. Dr. Drake was informed. There will be models of the first steamship to cross the Atlantic ocean, Robert Fulton's "Clermont," which he tried out on the Hudson river in 1809, and as a contrast there will be a model of the "Leviathan," the largest ocean liner operated by the government, built at a cost of \$25,000 by the shipping board. The "Leviathan" was recently put in the merchant marine service after being reconstructed at an expenditure of \$8,000,000.

Progress in land transportation will be shown by models of the early day locomotives and trains contrasted with the modern transcontinental flyer and development in air travel will be demonstrated with an extensive exhibit of airplanes from the earliest to the latest types.
