### MEDILL SCHOOL HAS UNIQUE COLLECTION

Journalism Department at North Western Has Library of Headlines

A library of American headlines and picture captions is the unique collection being made by the Medill School of Journalism of Northwestern University. Letters are going out to managing editors throughout the United States requesting that they send the school samples of news headlines, including streamers and picture captions used by their newspapers. This library, the first of its kind, will be primarily for the work of the class in news editing. The students will use it as a basis for systematic study and research in headline building. The headlines and captions will be pasted into folders and catalogued according to the name of the newspaper.

Editors are asked to mark the name of the paper, the office number of headline and the kinds of type comprising headlines when sending in their samples.

The value of this library will depend on its completeness and it is hoped that managing editors who are not reached by letter will contribute to it as well as those who receive special requests.

The Medill School of Journalism is also sending to various managing editors copies of a lesson sheet on the mechanics of headline writing, compiled by George C. Bastian, who directs the news editing course, for use in his classes.

### REVIEW OF MARTHA SUNG TUESDAY NIGHT

Why do we all like "Martha?" for it may be assumed that most of us do, including those who permit themselves to be enthusiastic and those who don't. Martha has stood the test of time, at least a considerable time as reckoned by the life of opera. With text by St. George and music by Frederik von Flotow, this opera was an elaboration of a ballet-pantomime, "Lady Henrietta," based on an actual incident, and first presented in Paris in 1844. Since that time it has been steadily building a place for itself which no passing fashion in the inner circles of musical criteria will be likely to affect. And why? Because Martha, in the making, has adhered to all the criteria which render an opera to the "people," and make it ultimately a general favorite.

In the first place, it is rich in dramatic incident, and its simple melodious music is admirably adapted to the high points of the drama. There is the delightful badinage of the Spinning Wheel quartet, suggestive of the whirl of the wheel both in music and rhyme. There is the spirited ode to porter beer sung by Plunkett, the pathos of M'appari which is so eloquent of despairing love the world over, the beloved "Last Rose of Summer", and the big swinging rhythm of the finale.

Set in the time of Queen Anne it is rich in the colorful atmosphere of the Fair Scene, and the hunting scene, and old England. Indeed, much of the score has a spirited pulse suggestive of the hunt which forms so conspicuous a part of the background of the opera. And then, Martha rests us from the tragic theme, and at the same time, runs the complete octave of emotion from laughter to pathos. For young folks, who are just beginning to see opera, nothing could be lovelier, simpler, or more wholesome. The music is lively and spirited. The plot is easily understood. As an opening wedge to the understanding of the principle of opera, where music and drama are welded into an artistic unit, this is the opera par excellence. For sheer "joy of life" to both young and old, one will go far to find its equal.

In the two performances of Martha this season, Act 1 has been given for the first time at Ravinia, an innovation which adds greatly to the enjoyment of the opera. Miss Mario lives up to the reputation of her predecessors in the name part, and Miss Gentle is delightful, as always, in the part of Nancy. Didur, with keen dramatic flair, gives a fine new flavor of John Bull in the Porter Song.

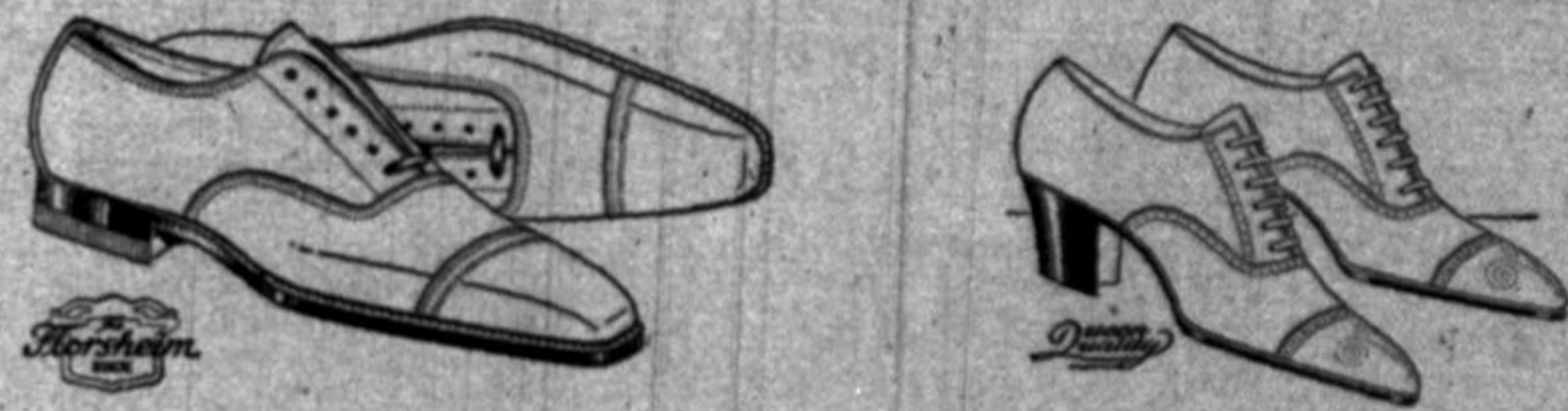
