NEW TEN MILE BRIDLE PATH FOR EVANSTON

Riders to Have Complete Circuit; Route Lies Through the Forest Preserve

With the completion of the ten-mile bridle path now being laid out west of Evanston through the Forest Preserve and along the east bank of the Chicago river, North Shore riding fans will have a considerable circuit over which to canter.

The stretch now being completed extends through the Forest Preserve for over three miles, from Church street on the south to the Happ road on the northwest of Winnetka. The path through the woods will skirt the east bank of the north branch of the Chicago river.

This new wood path will be joined with the path along the lake front to Evanston by a trail of soft roads. When the circuit is completed one may ride along the lake front in Evanston, north through the Northwestern University campus, west on the cinder pavement of Lincoln street to the drainage canal, thence southwest along the east bank of the canal to the Emerson street bridge and then west on Simpson and Church streets to the Forest Preserve.

From the Happ road on the north soft roads will lead back along the Gross Point and Niles Center roads to the intersection with Simpson street.

A circuit, similar to one being completed west of Evanston, is being laid out west of Winnetka and Highland Park. A part of this circuit will extend over the Skokie, which is to become part of the Forest Preserve.
