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### CONTRACT AWARDED FOR ZION PAVEMENT

DELAY SAVES CITY \$2,754

Work To Be Started Next Week;  
 Other Brief Items of Lake  
 County News

Contract for the paving of a half mile of Sheridan Road through the business district of Zion was awarded by the Board of Local Improvements of that city to the Zion Institutions and Industries upon their bid of \$75,246.50. The only other bid was that of John Darrow of Waukegan and A. C. Jacobson of Winthrop Harbor who agreed to do the work for \$77,729.50. The Board of Local Improvements consists of the following officials: Mayor W. H. Clendenin, Ralph Pihl and A. E. Huenerfager.

Under the terms of the contract work on the construction of the four blocks of pavement will start August 1, and will be rushed to completion before cold weather.

The first bids that were opened on June 30 were declared too high and were rejected.

The bids at that time were as follows:

Zion Institutions, \$82,300.  
 John Darrow, \$78,000.  
 By the rejection of these bids and the acceptance of the new bid this morning Zion saves \$2,754. The Zion contractors reduced their bid more than \$7,000 in order to be low. Two blocks of the proposed paving will be 76 feet wide, one block will be 52 feet wide with a 2-foot parkway, and one block will be 30 feet wide.

With the completion of this pavement Sheridan Road will be paved all through Zion and the only bad stretch of highway between Chicago and part of Sheridan road through Waukegan.

A fight to regain the former status of Great Lakes Naval Training station is being made by the Waukegan Chamber of Commerce in a letter to Congressman Carl Chindblom to ask for a deserved percentage of apprentice seamen that are continually being trained by the navy department. Behind the chamber in this fight will be Congressman Chindblom, every civic organization in the city, and the entire mid-west.

Instead of a training school for sailors the Chamber of Commerce will ask that a quarter of the 6,000 apprentice seamen, enlisted in the personnel of the navy, be stationed at Great Lakes, giving them the same number that Hampton Roads, Newport, and Mare Island are getting under the present naval ruling.

The absorbant section of the states attorney's office found a still that was still running since their last visit several weeks ago, and, as a result, information was filed against Otto Metzler, a farmer on the Bartlett farm, near Diamond lake, last Friday morning in county court for the manufacture and possession of illicit liquor, according to the report.

Most of the objections that had been expressed to the North Chicago paving project which was estimated at a cost of \$200,000, for between thirty and forty blocks of paving, were erased last Thursday night at a public hearing when it was found that only 8,000 of the proposed footage was objected to.

Burglars who broke into the T. H. McKinney & Son hardware store at North Chicago last night escaped with the entire stock of revolvers, nine in all, valued at approximately \$200.

Careful search of the store fails to reveal where anything else of value was taken.

Winthrop Harbor had a big time Saturday night to mark the opening of its white way. The village has installed a system of lights similar to those in Waukegan.

### WATER CARNIVAL AT WINNETKA SUNDAY

Winnetka's first annual water carnival will be held Sunday, July 30, at the Winnetka beach. The sporting event is to be under the auspices of the Park board, and it is planned to have a similar carnival each year.

One of the features is a hundred yard open relay race, in which teams from the other North Shore cities may enter. The other events are to be open to Winnetka citizens only. Relay races will be held for children of all ages. The open relay is to determine the championship of the North Shore.

The winners of each event will be awarded prizes. Among the events listed are: Fancy diving exhibition, life saving exhibition, canoe tilting, canoe racing, tub racing, a candle race, an umbrella race, water basket ball games and a pie eating contest.

A feature which is promised to be amusing is the Finnish Sack Fight, in which the contestants endeavor to knock each other off parallel bars into the water by means of a wet sack.
