

NEXT BOUTS MAY BE HELD AUGUST 15TH

American Legion at Fort Sheridan Already Arranging An Excellent Program

MRS. MELVIN JONES WINS WOMAN'S GOLF TITLE

CUMMINGS DEFEATS HERRON AT EXMOOR

Lake Forest Man Takes Title From Last Year's Winner

In one of the most remarkable finals of a local tournament, Dexter Cummings, Onwentsia club, defeated S. Davison Herron, Exmoor, national champion in 1919, 1 up, in the deciding match for the annual tournament of the Exmoor Country club.

The victory gave Cummings his first leg on the Exmoor trophy, which was won last year by Herron.

Herron was 2 up with four holes to play and looked like a winner, but the vagaries of the game, which had been demonstrated at a number of the preceding holes were emphasized when he missed a four foot putt on the fifteenth green and then blew a three footer at the sixteenth, making the match all square.

Of the eighteen holes played only five were halved. The game was replete with breaks, due partly to a gale from the southwest and rain which fell during the out round. Their driving was about equal, while Cummings' accurate approach putting was a feature, as he left himself few long putts.
