CAPT. EVANS GIVES CHINDBLOM CREDIT

Expresses Appreciation for \$40,000 Added Appropriation for the Fiscal Year

Congressman Carl R. Chindblom of this district is given full credit by Captain Waldo Evans, commandant of the Great Lakes Naval Training station, for having obtained a \$40,000 increase in the naval appropriation bill for the training station for the new fiscal year. Captain Evans has just sent a letter to Congressman Chindblom in which he expresses his hearty appreciation of the efforts put forth in obtaining a \$200,000 appropriation for this year.

A copy of this letter which bears the date of July 14, is as follows: My dear Mr. Chindblom:

I desire to avail myself of this opportunity to offer you an expression of our most grateful thanks for the timely and effective efforts you put forth in securing an increase in our appropriation from \$160,000, the amount approved by the House of Representatives, to \$200,000, while the Naval Appropriation Bill was pending before the Senate. It is our feeling that the success attending our efforts to secure this very reasonable increase is due very largely to the exercise of your interest, resourcefulness and untiring efforts in our behalf.

NORTH CHICAGO VOTES TO STAY "BROKE"

\$60,000 Bond Issue Defeated for Second Time Last Friday at Polls

The \$60,000 judgment bond issue for North Chicago was defeated last Friday at the polls by 60 votes.

The total number of votes cast was 579, there being 258 in favor of the bond issue and 318 against the proposition. Two defective and one sample ballot were cast.

The "North End" was declared to have been responsible for the defeat of the bond issue, which was to have been used for the payment of judgment against the city. City officials claimed that the opposition had a "machine" organization in that part of the city.

Until 1 p. m. only 235 votes had been cast, when Mayor Henry Deacon, Walter Atkinson, city treasurer and James H. Gallagher, city clerk, got out to work for the proposition.

Mayor Deacon stated today that the city will try to get along on the taxes that are now coming in, and he also expressed the belief that the city can borrow enough more at the banks to enable it to keep the police and fire departments in operation and to keep the street lights going despite the fact that after the defeat of the bond issue for the first time several months ago, the city notified the Public Service company to shut off the lights because they had no means of paying the bills, and cut down the number of employees of the police and fire departments.

Just how the city expects to meet its judgment debts Mayor Deacon did not say. He said he might have a statement to make later concerning the cause of the second defeat of the bond issue.

BANK RECORDS GONE; INJUNCTION SOUGHT

Attorneys for Grant Park Bank Declare Brundage Has the Books

Atty. Eugene M. Runyard, of Waukegan, appeared in the Lake county Circuit court Saturday afternoon and before Judge Claire C. Edwards entered a motion on behalf of the First Trust & Savings bank of Kankakee, the Grant Park Trust & Savings bank, and the Grant Park Trust company, of Grant Park, for the return to the banks of their records, obtained by the prosecution in the conspiracy case against Gov. Len Small, by subpoena, and which the counsel for the defense claims were gathered up at the termination of the trial and taken to Chicago where they are now in the possession of Atty. Gen. Brundage.

Atty. Garfield Charles, representing the attorney general, opposed Mr. Runyard's motion, claiming that the banks' records are obsolete and that the banks can have no further use for them. Attorney Runyard argued that if Charles' argument is logical, a burglar might take a man's property, and then refuse to return it because the owner had no use for it.

Judge Edwards denied the motion, and the banks now will be required to attempt to get them back through other process of law.

When the trial was completed the attorneys for the governor were so jubilant they forgot all about gathering up the records of the banks, having submitted no other records belonging to the governor.
