COL. SPRAGUE WANTS HOSPITAL AT STATION

Letter to President Protests Location of Proposed Institution Elsewhere

Col. A. A. Sprague, chairman of the American Legion's hospitalization committee, sent a telegram last Thursday from Chicago to President Harding in which the chief executive is asked to reconsider his decision announcing the location of two new neuro-psychiatric hospitals for the treatment of army mental cases.

The President announced last week that one of the hospitals would be at St. Cloud, Minn., and the other at Camp Custer, Mich. Neither of these sites is suitable for the proper treatment of psychopathic cases, states Col. Sprague. He asserts that his belief is backed by the best medical opinion.

Near Big Guns
The Camp Custer site adjoins the artillery range, and the St. Cloud location is too far from the medical centers, the telegram states. The same objections may be offered to the hospital proposed for Chillicothe, Ohio.

The text of the program: "From reliable sources the Legion has learned that definite arrangements have been made to locate the neuro-psychiatric hospitals at St. Cloud, Minn., and Camp Custer, Mich., instead of at Minneapolis and St. Paul and at Great Lakes, Ill. Best medical opinion both within the bureau and without does not favor these locations, believing they are not close to known medical centers where best recognized medical personnel is available who will devote part of their valuable time to this work. Same situation exists in regard to the selection of Chillicothe, Ohio.

"The Legion respectfully requests that you reconsider these decisions, and, if you are not satisfied with the character of the board of consultants who have recommended against these locations, to summon your own committee of experts and act upon their advice."
