## NEW TRIER DAY SET FOR AUGUST 23RD

Commercial Association Will  
Have Charge of Township  
Festivities

New Trier Day, the one day of the entire year when the business men of several north shore villages play host to the citizenry of the township, falls, this season, on Wednesday, August 23. The annual outing, conducted under auspices of the New Trier Commercial association, will be held at American Legion park, Gross Point, located on Lake avenue just west of the Ridge.

Preliminary plans for New Trier Day were discussed at an enthusiastic session of the Commercial association last week. After the meeting, Lloyd F. Hollister, president of the association, appointed the New Trier Day General committee, naming Alfred D. Hermann, cashier of the Winnetka Trust and Savings bank, as chairman.

**Strong Committee Named**  
Business men who will serve with Mr. Herman on this committee, which is to have complete supervision of all details connected with the annual township outing, are Henry C. Cordell, Carl E. Sterner, William T. Wberstedt and Dr. C. B. Blake. Every member of the association is pledged to lend active support in perfecting the plans, which, according to present indications, will provide the most spectacular and generally successful New Trier Day in the history of the event.

As has been customary in other years, New Trier Day activities will begin early in the morning with a gigantic Ballyhoo parade including floats representative of many north shore concerns, appropriately decorated automobiles and other interesting procession features. The "line of march" will be through all the principal thoroughfares of the township.

## FIREMAN KIDNAPPED. ROBBED AND BEATEN

Thugs Entice Fallon Into Machine; Then Carry Him To Chicago

James Fallon, 117 North Buttrick street, fireman at the Central station in Waukegan is under the care of a physician at his home as the result of the rough treatment he received at the hands of two Chicago auto bandits who beat, robbed and kidnapped him.

With his face battered and bleeding from blows which had been rained on it, and with his body bruised from the effects of several kicks, he was dropped from the automobile at Grimm and Lawrence avenues, Chicago. The car then speeded away.

Fallon made his way to the nearest fire station and was assisted to the Milwaukee avenue police station where he gave a report of the affair. Within half an hour the police rounded up fifteen automobiles in the district, but Fallons reported that none of the occupants were his assailants.

He was removed to the office of Dr. Leslie D. Dougherty, 2923 West Armitage avenue and after being cared for he was removed to his home in Waukegan.

Wednesday was Fallon's day off and he went to Druce Lake in the afternoon. While there he met a couple of well-dressed strangers who told him they were from Chicago. They were pleasing chaps and Fallon grew to like them. When they offered to bring him to Waukegan in their big Hudson automobile he was delighted.

He rode in the front seat with the driver. The other rode in the rear seat. At Green Bay road and Twenty-second street Fallon pointed out that the driver should turn but he kept on toward Chicago. Fallon protested. Suddenly the man in the rear seat threw his arm around his neck in an attempt to strangle him.

Fallon grabbed hold of the steering wheel and the car careened into the ditch but did not turn over. The local fireman then jumped from the car and gave battle to the two bandits who closed in on him. He was holding his own in good shape when one of them struck him across the face with a heavy wrench, causing him to lose consciousness temporarily.

It was at this time that he was robbed of \$58 in cash and a diamond stick pin which he valued at more than \$100.

As he started to regain his senses he struggled and the men pounced on him, kicking and beating him into submission. Then they forced him back into the car. One of them pressed a revolver against his side all the way to Chicago, warning him against crying out.

The attack west of North Chicago took place some time after six o'clock. It was not until ten-thirty that the bandit car arrived in Chicago as the thugs drove in a circuitous manner to avoid getting to Chicago before dark.

When the car reached Grimm and Lawrence avenues Fallon was thrown out unceremoniously.
