DEERFIELD ENTERS NEW ERA OF PROGRESS

(Continued from page 1)

During the past year several good trains on the C. M. & St. P. railroad have been added to the Deerfield schedule. One train arriving at 1:15 p. m. (daylight saving time) makes no stop between Chicago and Deerfield. Other improvements in the service have been made, partly as a result of Briergate's opening.

The Deerfield State bank, although only one year old, has increased its business greatly during the last few months, and now has more than 500 depositors.

A score of new homes are being built. The Calkins place is the largest of these. John Woodman has erected four houses, and is working on two others. Gilbert D. Johnson & Brother dealers in north shore real estate, have opened the Von Linde subdivision north of Deerfield avenue and east of Waukegan road.

A new street, Rosemary terrace, halves the land. Two and a half and five acre plots are being sold in Deerfield Manor, opposite the Briergate club. Fred Stryker is building a six room stucco house, and A. L. Taylor is putting up a cement colonial house.

This week the new Deerfield building ordinance becomes effective. It regulates the construction of buildings in the village, and requires that a permit must be issued before any improvement is started. Indirectly, it will have the effect of a zoning ordinance in many ways. The complete ordinance is published in another page of this issue.

Deerfield business men are active. The stocks of the R. H. Stryker store and the Deerfield Mercantile Co. have been increased in size and variety. Theo. J. Knaak, druggist, and M. A. Frantz, hardware merchant, declare that their sales have shown large increases during the past year. William M. Seiler, electrical contractor, has opened an up-to-date shop in Deerfield avenue. E. H. Willman is enlarging and improving his shoe store. The Deerfield Mercantile Co. has installed a new radio outfit. The Lake County Oil Co. has just opened a new bulk station.

Deerfield is awake and on the road to progress. It is daily coming to have more in common with Highland Park and the other cities of the north shore.

road and St. Johns avenue.

Line of march as follows:
St. Johns avenue to Central avenue; east on Central to Linden (Foot parade, including bicycles and etc., reaching one of the two intersections of the central parkway along Central avenue will do "column left" march westward along the north side of Central avenue stopping at Sheridan Road, thereby affording the opportunity of viewing the full parade as they move along on the south side of Central avenue); from Linden and Central all horse-drawn and motorized vehicles will turn on Sheridan Road; south on Sheridan Road to Central, rejoining with the foot parade; full parade will resume position and march westward on Central avenue to Green Bay Road; north on Green Bay road to Sunset Park.
