NEW POSTMASTER AT WAUKEGAN IN OFFICE
HOLD BOOSTER MEETINGS
Zion Paving Started. Motor Buses at Waukegan. Other Items of Lake County News

Mancel Talbot last week "checked in" as Waukegan's new postmaster, the retiring official, Daniel A. Grady, transferring his accounts to his successor.
The transfer was made without calling in an inspector, who would have been summoned had either the retiring official or the incoming postmaster desired.
Mr. Grady declared: "My successor will have the benefit of an efficient force and their cooperation means much, because no matter how good a man a postmaster is, he must depend largely upon the loyalty of the postal employees under his administration."
"It has been exactly nine years, one month and thirteen days since I took charge of this office. Beginning tomorrow I'm going to take a good vacation, the first I have been able to take in eight years. Until I get ready to get into the harness again I'm not going to make any plans."

The series of booster meetings that are being held in various parts of Lake county to arouse interest in the Lake County Fair, which is to be held at Libertyville the first part of September are meeting with unusual success and if this counts for anything the fair will be the biggest and best the county ever has known.
Another successful booster meeting was held at Round Lake on Thursday. Representative W. F. Weiss was the speaker of the occasion. There was a band and the four hundred who attended expressed the greatest enthusiasm.

Seven one-ton Ford trucks arrived in Zion Monday night. These trucks are to be used for the hauling of crushed stone, sand and gravel for the new half-mile of concrete road to be built through the city. The trucks are known as the Lee Line Automatic Dump Trucks, they being equipped with the Lee dump body.
A gang of men were started to work on the south section of Zion road Tuesday morning. They are laying a sewer pipe, preparatory to the new road going in, as the con-

tractor will begin at the south section. Next week the work on the half-mile strip will be well under way, and the main street will present a busy scene with the trucks plying back and forth and the concrete mixers at work.

Lake county delegations returned Thursday night from Danville where they attended three state conventions which were held jointly. These were the County Clerks and County Supervisors; the Circuit Clerks and County Recorders, and the County Treasurers' conventions. Those who attended from Lake county were: Martin Ringdahl, chairman of the Lake County Board of Supervisors; County Clerk Lew A. Hendee, Circuit Clerk L. O. Brockway, County Treasurer Roy Bracher, Deputy County Treasurer Ira Pearsall and Supervisors W. J. Stratton, Emil Fickle and W. O. Samson. It was the 36th annual convention.
All the delegates were more than pleased with the reception accorded them at Danville. A sixty-mile ride over the paved roads in that vicinity was one of the most enjoyable features. A big barbecue and vaudeville show also were held.
Some exceedingly fine addresses were heard, one of the most interesting of which was a discussion of the provisions of the new constitution by Hon. H. L. Green. "Our Road Problems," including the new county highway law, was the subject of an address by Hon. Richard D. Meents.
County Clerk Lew A. Hendee of Waukegan was re-elected to the office of treasurer. Most of the delegates from Lake county made the trip in automobiles.

When the North Shore line completes the installation of its motor bus lines in Waukegan that city will be supplied with as perfect transportation facilities as can be found in any community.
The present street cars operate to the south limits and to Glen Flora avenue on the north, running down to Sheridan road. The Washington street line operates to the west city limits.
This leaves the people of Grand avenue and the great northwest the only ones without adequate transportation. Within another month the North Shore line will have its fine large motor buses operating to the west city limits on Grand avenue, supplying accommodation to thousands and the proposed bus line along Sheridan road from Waukegan to Kenasha will supply accommodations to those not on the other lines of motor or electric line travel.
