OBJECTORS WIN IN TAX LITIGATION

ARE SUSTAINED BY COURT

Judge Persons Decides Thirty Per Cent Horizontal Increase in Highland Park Illegal

Judge Perry L. Persons, in the county court, Monday rendered an opinion in the tax litigation arising out of the 1921 levies for the cities of Highland Park and Lake Forest. After calling attention to the importance of the case and its recurrence for three successive years, continued as follows:

"I need not state that personnel of counsel or parties, officers or individuals, if this Court is to perform its duty impartially and without fear or favor, has no place and is not to be considered in this statutory proceeding involving, as it does, many questions of law and fact. We have been reminded during the hearings of what similar difficulties which have arisen during the past three years on presentation to this court each June by the county treasurer of his application for judgment for delinquent taxes, following which, in every case, much dissatisfaction has been expressed by certain property owners in court with the method by which the taxes involved were levied. Counsel have recalled the Hawkins and Buchanan cases, so-called, in the circuit court of this county; the Vail and Abrahamson cases, so-called, in which divisions of this court, in sustaining objections to certain taxes for 1919, were affirmed by the supreme court; the Orvis case, so-called, involving taxes for 1920, in which the decision of this court on the two points involving notice by the board of review, then reviewed, was reversed by the supreme court; and other objections heard in this court in which no appeal was taken by either party, all of which tend to show a lamentable lack

Burial took place in Memorial Park cemetery. Mrs. Lindbloom had during her long residence here made a host of friends, to whom the news of her death came as a great shock. ADOPT AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

COUNCIL MET ON FRIDAY

Property Owners Petition City Not to Grant Permit for a Dry Cleaning Tank

At the regular meeting of the city council last Friday evening a petition was read from property owners in Block 22, the territory bounded by Central avenue, Sheridan road, Park avenue and Linden avenue, asking that permission be not granted to John Zengler to install a tank to contain dry cleaning liquid on the property which he recently purchased from the North Shore Gas Co. The petition was referred to the building inspector with the instruction that no permit be issued until he had conferred with the council concerning the matter.

A petition was presented, signed by Theo. Schürmann and others requesting the opening of several streets in the south part of Highland Park by condemnation. The matter was referred to Windes & Marsh, engineers, for a report.

The bills and pay roll for the period from June 15 to Aug. 1, amounting to \$10,418.55, were allowed and ordered paid.

The building inspector reported the collection of \$771.58 for July. Partial payments to contractors who are constructing concrete pavements in the city were ordered made.

Raymond E. Herman, George R. Roberts and J. J. Brand, members of the Board of Appeals for the zoning ordinance, recommended to the council the adoption of an ordinance amending certain sections of the new zoning ordinance. The council followed this advice and adopted the ordinance.

The Board of Appeals also advised the city not to issue a permit for the construction of a large hotel on the property in Central avenue adjoining the Witten building on the east. The permit was requested by Anderson & Cowie.

An ordinance was adopted prohibiting the discharge of waste oil, grease or gasoline into any public sewer.

The final acceptance of the new water mains in the First Addition to Ravinia Highlands was granted.
