**STATE BODY WOULD
PROSECUTE TERRORISTS**

Mayor Hastings of Highland
Member of District Com-
mittee

With committees already acting or
being formed in every community in
the state, the campaign of the Illi-
nois Chamber of Commerce for the
raising of a fund for the detection
and prosecution of those guilty of
the Herrin mine massacre swung in-
to full action today. Through the
active co-operation of affiliated cham-
bers of commerce in 102 cities, with
36,000 members, and by appeals di-
rect to every business man in the
state, it is expected that a hearty
response to the campaign will be felt
within a few hours.

The state Herrin committee of the
Illinois Chamber has been announced.
Its members are: George Woodruff
of Joliet, chairman; Wayne Hummer
of La Salle, and Gerald B. Franks of
Peoria. In addition, each chamber of
commerce in the state has placed its
quota in the hands of a local commit-
tee. Co-operating with these are the
board of directors of the five districts
of the state, who are:

J. R. Jackson, Freeport; H. H. Cleve-
land, Rock Island; C. E. White, Mo-
line, and John H. Camlin, Rockford.

District No. 5—Samuel M. Hast-
ings, Highland Park; Blaine S.

ago; Britton T. Budd, Chicago; Alex.
F. Beaubien, Waukegan, and D. B.
Piersen, Aurora.

Individual contributions and strong
letters of indorsement of the cam-
paign are already flooding the offices
of the Illinois Chamber in the Otis
building in Chicago. All agree with
the issue raised by President John
H. Camlin that Illinois must win
vindication of the charge that it con-
doned the massacre and that its citi-
zens now are apathetic toward the
prosecution of the slayers. The let-
ters and telegrams leave no doubt
that the citizens of the state resent
the nationwide criticism and stand
solidly behind those officials who
seek to bring the guilty ones to jus-
tice.

Handicapped by a lack of funds,
both State's Attorney Duty of Wil-
lamson County, and Attorney Gener-
al Edward J. Brundage have been un-
able to employ the necessary investi-
gations, seek out the important wit-
nesses and retain the special prose-
cutors to collect and handle the mass
of evidence that will be needed before
the grand jury and the trial court.
Both have pledged their heartfelt ef-
fort toward securing indictments and
pushing subsequent prosecution if
provided with funds. It was in this
emergency that the Illinois Chamber
of Commerce decided to act, after
consultation with Governor Small,
Lieut. Governor Sterling and other
officials.
