**RECORD TIDE MARKS
STORM ALONG SHORE**

ZION HIT BY BIG DOWNPOUR

Mysterious Storm Misses This Part of the North Shore But Effects Are Felt Here

A tide, one that is rated as being the greatest ever noted along the north shore, surged Wednesday night and late last Thursday afternoon, the dregs of the storm that raged all along Lake Michigan shores. A drop of between three or four feet of water was noted every time the tide ebbed, while at full tide the water was higher than for years, according to veterans of the lake front.

The antics of the water, according to those who have spent a lifetime along the lake front, can be traced to the storm. Near Zion City the storm raged fully thirty minutes Wednesday afternoon, with rain and hail beating down in an unmerciful downpour.

Chicago and suburbs came in for a diminutive hurricane. How it happened to dodge this part of the north shore leaving only the record tide to tell of the storm puzzles the long-shoremen.

A drowning was prevented last week at Diamond Lake by the quick work of a couple of high school boys attending New Trier, according to Coroner J. L. Taylor, of Libertyville.

George Matthews, his wife and their 5 year old grandson were in mid-lake fishing. They were changing seats when the boat capsized, throwing the entire party in the lake. The boy and Matthews were able to reach the boat after a struggle, but the woman, exhausted by her efforts, sank beneath the surface. The two New Trier boys noted her plight and swam to the rescue. As she was going down for the second time they managed to get hold of her clothing and keep her afloat until help came. She was unconscious when taken from the water.

Coroner Taylor was called and he used the pulmotor to revive her. She was taken to her home in Evanston.

Col. Tripp, Quartermaster General of the Illinois National Guard was in Waukegan last week to close a 2 year lease for the Waukegan Armory on the basis of \$304 a month. The lease was made out between Col. Tripp for the Illinois National Guard and the Battery C Company of Waukegan. Colonel A. V. Smith signed for the Battery.

John Lavnovitz, said to live near Milburn, was peacefully sleeping off a jag in the police station in Waukegan Friday, because he became too boisterous and started playing tattoos on prospective "moon" customers' noses, according to police.

At 6:05 Thursday night the police got a call at 212 Picadilly court where a man was there making a disturbance. When the police arrived they found that a man had been there with a Ford truck trying to sell "moon" to one of the gentry of the street. Lack of sales ability started a fight and the provender of "moon," who police learned later was Lavnovitz, opened up with lefts and rights on the prospective customer. He had made a get-away before police arrived. Mike Gaspkowski was the customer.

By a vote of 1244 to 1083 voters of the city of Waukegan last week defeated Mayor Bidinger's water works plan, the majority of 161 against it having come from all but the second or down town ward.

BELVIDERE ROAD REFUND IS ASSURED

Supt. of Highways Russell Returns from Conference in Capital

Assurance that the refund to Lake county on the Belvidere road work would be forthcoming in plenty of time to take care of the financing of construction work to be done on Grand avenue and the Lake Villa section, was given Charles E. Russell, county superintendent of highways, in an interview with Gov. Len Small, Col. Miller, and others in charge of the state highway department. Supt. Russell returned to Lake county today after an absence of five days, which he spent in Springfield, getting county road plans under way.

The state officials declared that the refund had been held up over a trivial matter, which, when called to their attention, they pronounced as "foolish" and gave assurance that the refund would be forthcoming. The refund was held up on account of non-acceptance of Belvidere road after the county had completed the work.

With the refund matter settled the only thing which now stands in the way of building the Grand avenue and Lake Villa sections at once is the shortage of gravel, sand and concrete, due to strike conditions. Bids were opened for the Grand avenue job August 28. The strike situation has cut the output of the cement companies four-fifths, and Supt. Russell was informed that the state is receiving only six carloads of cement a day for county and state work for the entire state road building program.

Supt. Russell witnessed the Eaton road tests in progress in Springfield,

which are being made to show what kind of hard roads will stand the winter wear. To date the concrete roads are standing up better than brick according to Supt. Russell.
