HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

There are but few changes in the faculty this year. Miss Florence Morgan, efficient and popular teacher of mathematics, was called to the Liggett School in Detroit, as head of the department there. Mr. Clyde A. Hunting of the Stevens Point High School, Wisconsin, has been called to fill her position. He is an exceptional young man, well qualified both by training and natural ability for the position he is filling.

Miss Viola C. Lewis of the English Department has retired from the profession. Rumor says she is to be married. Miss Lewis was a most efficient teacher and a woman of the highest type. Miss Alberta Metcalf of Bloomington, Iowa, takes her place. When Professor Lewis went from the training school of the University of Iowa to the superintendency at Rockford, Illinois, he took Miss Metcalf with him, and at Rockford she was regarded as an unusually able teacher of English.

Miss Muriel Smith of Evanston, graduate of Northwestern University and of the Evanston Hospital Training Course will act as school nurse in the place of Miss Carson whose family moved to Des Moines.

All five of the graduates who took the College Entrance Board Examinations in June passed successfully and will be admitted to colleges requiring such examinations. Last year the number of students reached 670 in the second semester. It was expected that this year there would be not more than 600 in attendance due to the smaller graduating classes from the eighth grades of the several schools in the district. But so many strangers in the district have entered that the total registration will probably exceed by considerable that of last year. Probably the second semester will see the enrollment in excess of 700.

ELM PLACE SCHOOL

Preliminary to the opening of school the teaching staff of Elm Place School met on Saturday, Sept. 9, for a one-day "institute" to discuss educational problems and prepare for the work of the new year. School began Monday morning with an auditorium assembly attended by all the pupils except the Kindergartners. The total enrollment for the opening day was 725, Kindergarten included. This large total enrollment does not mean large class enrollment but it does necessitate resourcefulness in utilizing every available space that can be turned into a classroom.
