The following old players are returning, according to latest information received by the coach: Henry Penfield, who plays tackle; Jimmie Patterson, captain of the team, who plays fullback; Ollie Dahl, who usually plays guard; Erwin, also a guard; Putnam, who plays tackle; young McElwain who played end in several games last season; Rembe, who has been tried at quarter and who seemed promising; Blumenthal, also a good quarterback who did stellar work last season; Chuck Palmer, the reliable halfback; Weinecke, captain of last year's freshman team, whose natural position is fullback; Davis, a young tackle who has many good points and Hanson who likes the quarterback position and who showed up well in spring practice.

A few of these boys happen to reside in or near Evanston and are limbering up by taking daily runs; few if any have touched the pigskin this summer and may not for ten days to come. The weather hasn't been favorable, Coach Thistlewaite pointed out, and whenever a man has come to him to ask for suggestions he has told him merely to keep in good trim and to be ready for a hard season.

The coach has been keeping in touch with the old men, however, and he and Captain Paterson have held several conferences. Letters have gone out to the old players urging them to be on hand early with the idea of getting into good physical trim for the big grind. Palmer and one or two others have been doing guard duty on the lake shore and are in splendid shape right now. Glen Magnuson who broke his leg last season and who was expected to be able to get into the game this fall is still limping a bit and is not counted on by the coach to play. He, too, has been taking on a tan as a bathing-beach guard.

"I have no predictions to make," was Coach Thistlewaite's statement, when asked for a bit of optimism for Purple fans. "I have hopes, however, of splendid backing, both on the campus from the students and beyond the campus gates from the thousands of Purple graduates. I want this spirit to remain and to grow. I want to foster a permanent sentiment at Northwestern that will insure us our share of material and our share of victories. We must build constantly for the future and if we have the right sort of co-operation we shall build, and, in the course of time, win some games. As to this year, we must first of all get out a rousing big crowd for practice and start the season with all the hope and optimism in the world. We shall try and try very hard to mold a strong football team at Northwestern."
