MENTAL ALERTNESS TESTS FOR "FROSH"

Northwestern to Give Students Psychological Examination for Intelligence

For the first time in its history Northwestern University this year is conducting mental alertness tests upon its freshmen in large groups of from 400 to 600 at a time, beginning Monday afternoon, Sept. 18.

Fisk hall on the Evanston campus was utilized for the first test and Prof. L. Winfield Webb, professor of psychology, is director of the tests. Prof. Webb has a staff of able assistants and the test is given a time limit. All freshmen are expected to take the test and assignment to sections or classes will be made upon the results achieved.

A second mental alertness test "in the wholesale," as one campus wit dubbed it was held Wednesday at the same time and place. President Scott explained that whereas heretofore division of classes in such popular subjects as mathematics, English, and foreign languages had been without special regard to the brilliance of the students, he was in hopes that professors would this year utilize the result of the wholesale tests and classify their young men and women accordingly.

"Students who show marked superior intelligence will be permitted to register for more hours of instruction than others," commented President Scott, "and such students may thus shorten the period of college training from four to three years."

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
