FOREST PRESERVE HORSEBACK JAUNT

TO BE HELD OCTOBER 1
Equestrians of Chicago and Vicinity Are Invited to Participate in Ride; Offer Prizes

Arrangements are being made for a special horseback ride, Sunday, October 1, open to all riders in Chicago and vicinity, starting at 9 A. M., from the stables of the North Shore Polo Club, (Lincoln and Peterson Aves.) and going through the Edgebrook, Evanston and Glencoe riding zones. The ride will be a splendid opportunity to get acquainted with the Forest Preserve areas. Ransom Kennicott, chief Forester of Cook county, has accepted an invitation to ride with the party.

Dinner will be served at 12:30 near the Lake-Cook county line, for horses and riders, and the return trip will start at 1:30, ending at the polo club grounds. William J. Sutherland, President of the Chicago Equestrian club, and Wayne Dinmore, Secretary of the Horse Association of America, will lead the ride.

First, second and third prize ribbons will be awarded at the end of the day in the following classes: First, for the most graceful woman rider; second, for the woman making the

ride with greatest ease to her horse; third, for the most graceful man rider; fourth, for the man who makes the ride with greatest ease to his horse; fifth, for the most graceful girl rider, 16 years or under; sixth, for the girl making the ride with greatest ease to her horse; seventh, for the most graceful boy rider, 16 years or under; eighth, for the boy making the ride with the greatest ease to his horse.

As many of the riders will not be on their own horses, the riders and riding will be judged, not the horses. The judges, who are experienced riders, will ride with the party and will judge the riders during the 30 mile trip, and awards will go to those who make the best showing during the entire ride. The identity of the judges will not be disclosed until the end of the ride, so that those participating will have no way of knowing when they are, or are not, under the observation of the judges.
