DELAY IN RAISING "BLOT QUOTA" FUND

COMMITTEE URGES HASTE

Reminds Public of Donations of Funds Needed in the Herrin Murder Prosecution

With a view to completing at an early date the raising of Highland Park's quota of the fund being provided by the Illinois Chamber of Commerce for the prosecution of the perpetrators of the Herrin massacre, the committee named by the Highland Park Business Men's association for that purpose is sending out a last call for subscriptions.

This committee, composed of Lyle Gourley, chairman; Frank W. Sheahan, and James Duffy, was appointed at the meeting of business men, it is the Business Men's association, Tuesday, Sept. 5, to receive donations to this fund. So far, members of the committee reported yesterday, only one check for \$5 had been received.

Expect Prompt Response

Because of the unanimous expression of support for the cause given at the meeting of business men, it is the belief of the committee that the delay in the accumulation of Highland Park's quota is not because Highland Park citizens are lukewarm in the matter of helping to eradicate the blot on the honor of the state of Illinois caused by the Herrin murders, but rather that the matter has been generally overlooked under pressure of more urgent business, and, therefore the committee is again bringing the matter of the "blot quota" to the attention of the people of Highland Park, confident that the small amount allotted to this city will be readily underwritten by its citizens.

All sums which it is desired to contribute to the fund and all checks should be turned over to one of the members of the committee referred to, and they will see that the donations reach the treasurer of the Herrin massacre fund of the Illinois Chamber of Commerce. The committee is anxious that this matter be closed at an early date in order that Highland Park may not be counted laggard in this patriotic cause of aiding in the enforcement of the laws and restoration of ordered liberty in this state.
