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BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

PAUPER SUES PHYSICIAN

Teacher Claims Violation of Contract; Other Interesting Items of Lake County News

Suit for \$20,000 damages against Dr. A. E. Brown, former county physician, has been filed in the circuit court, by Albert C. Jackson, inmate of the county poor farm, who charges that the defendant struck and otherwise mistreated him while he was a patient at the county hospital, and that the injuries have resulted in permanently incapacitating him, as well as having compelled him to become an object of charity.

Jackson was taken to the county hospital Dec. 1, 1920, and two days later Dr. Brown stood him up, although Jackson claimed he was almost too weak to stand, and punched him in the ribs, stomach and sides, injuring to such an extent that he has been permanently injured, the bill charges.

D. P. Mitchell, former teacher in the school, filed suit for \$3,000 damages against the directors of school district No. 65, which is in Lake Bluff, alleging breach of contract in connection with the manner in which he was prevented from teaching the school during 1921-22.

Mitchell who now is said to be located at Oswego, Ill., taught in the Lake Bluff school and also served as principal during the season of 1920-21. Early in the spring the directors entered into a contract with him, it is declared to teach the following fall. However, before the first season closed the directors became dissatisfied with his work and hired another teacher, it was claimed.

Waukegan boys are eating between meals again. Anyway that's the complaint that comes from parties in the Morrow apartments in that city which alleges that boys are disturbing them by eating out of the garbage cans in the rear of the building.

It wouldn't be so bad according to the complainants, but after the boys finish with the feast they leave the remains of the banquet on the ground, and the garbage can overturned.

To save Sheridan road for a residential district, and to prevent through truck transfer companies from damaging the roads that they do not help to maintain, the Chamber of Commerce of Waukegan, launched a proposition to declare the street a boulevard that will force trucks upon other streets in their course through that city.

The purchase of coal in Waukegan has been placed on a strictly cash basis. This announcement was made by local dealers in a formal statement to the public. Unusual conditions in the coal industry, the dealers explain, has forced them to adopt the cash basis.

Two regiments of field artillery and several detachments of cavalry and infantry have returned to Fort Sheridan from Camp Custer, where they had been since April 22. The troops, under the command of Maj. Doe, consisted of the 5th and 6th Field Artillery; the 1st Battalion, 2d Infantry; Service Company, 2d Infantry, and the 2d Company, 14th Cavalry.

Judge Claire C. Edwards of Lake county circuit court has gone to Wisconsin for a two weeks vacation where he plans fishing for "muskie."

Mrs. Edwards accompanied him on the trip and he will return in time for the convention of the grand jury during October. He will fish in the neighborhood of Eagle river.

Samuel Shockley, colored, confessed killer of Crawford "Bosco" Burns, also colored, at the Covington dance pavilion on the south county line near Glencoe, August 31, was bound over to the grand jury last week by Justice Hervey Coulson, under bonds of \$10,000, on a charge of murder. George Field, his attorney, made no defense. He was taken to the jail in default of bonds.

According to R. H. Weeks of Waukegan one of the most active members of the Lake County Radio club, a new home is being sought that will be suitable as well as accessible to all members. The home will remain in Waukegan.

J. V. Balz, Waukegan justice of the peace, completed 20 years on the "call list" of the fire department last week, entitling him to a pension from the city when he reaches fifty years of age.

A spirit of real Americanism prevailed at the reception for 47 persons who last week were admitted to citizenship in the circuit court, and there was a good attendance at the patriotic meeting held in their honor under the auspices of the American Legion, assisted by the various patriotic organizations at Waukegan.

Erection of a memorial for the students of Waukegan township high school who served in the World War will take place on Armistice Day this year, and the committee in charge is completing the arrangements to make this a notable event in the history of the school.

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
