Take Deciding Contest in Intercity Series; Opponents Miss Several Chances

There was nothing spectacular about the game—Highland Park played the better brand of baseball and clearly earned their victory but the one-sided score does not truly represent the merits of the two teams. The score in earned runs was 4 to 0. In the first inning, with two men out Beany Jackson let Therrien's little roller trickle between his legs to score two runs when it should have been the third out. In the third Alf Lindenmeyer dropped his third fly of the season and allowed two more runs to center across the plate as a gift to the youngsters. In the seventh Glaze let Rudolph's high fly get away from him for two additional runs, which should never have been and then for good measure Brown made a wild heave past the catcher to allow Therrien to amble home with the seventh unearned marker.

Highland Park earned one run in the first inning when Martin dropped a little Texas Leaguer into right and G. Glader smashed a long triple to left with Swift's war club. The second tally to which they were entitled came in the fifth on three consecutive blows by the first three men up. The third was scored in the same inning when Carlson was running down Glader between first and second. The fourth and last was in the seventh on a triple by Therrien. As it finally turned out, Glaze was facing a hopeless task because it is impossible for the best pitcher in the world to win if his team mates cannot make runs for him.
