POSTAGE REDUCED ON AUTO PLATES

License Numbers and Certificates May Be Mailed at Less Cost

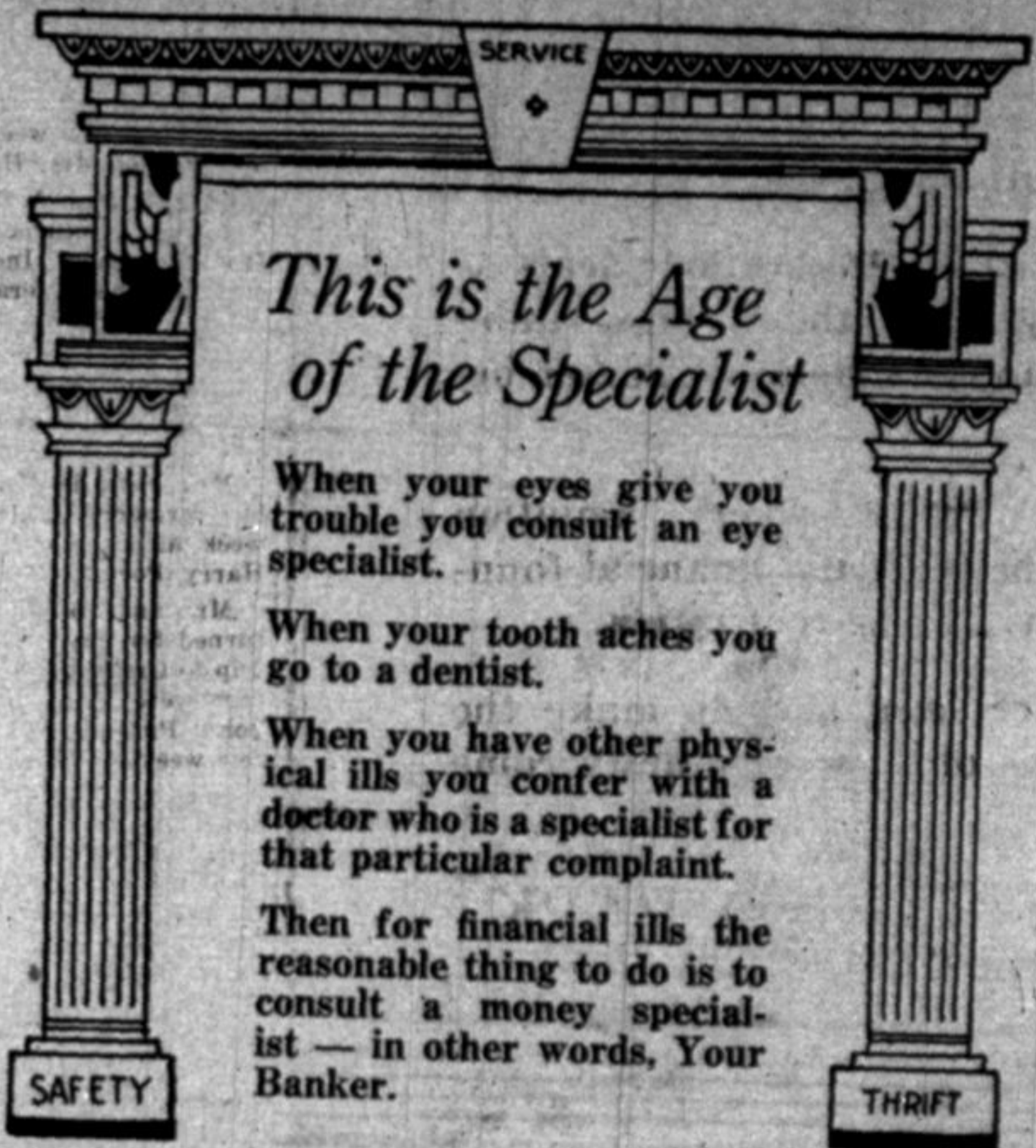
The state will save \$16,000 in postage annually on automobile plates sent out by the automobile department as the result of a ruling obtained from the postmaster general by Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson, it was announced today.

With each set of plates a certificate is sent containing the information on which the license is issued. Some years ago Secretary Emmerson worked out a system by which the plates and certificate could be included in the same package, but in separate envelopes, thus saving a great deal of clerical effort and expense. The postoffice department, however, while holding this system permissible, declared the certificate first class matter and required a two-cent stamp for it in addition to the amount required to carry the package by parcel post.

Efforts have been made to obtain a modification of this rule, but the authorities have remained firm until this year.

Just before letting the contract for the new 1923 license blanks and certificates, Secretary Emmerson sent Walter W. Miller of the automobile department to Washington to make another effort to have the rule modified. As a result, a certificate was agreed upon which will pass muster without first class postage, but at the same time will contain all of the information now written on the certificates.

At least 800,000 licenses will be issued next year and the saving of 2 cents on each will mean a total saving of \$16,000.
